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## From the Principal

Parents/Guardians:

Report cards will be coming home on November 2, please look for them. We hope this will be a time for you to compliment and praise your child for a job "well done". Please remember to focus on setting academic expectations for your child. Research consistently shows that students feel more positive and connected to their school when they believe that hard work will lead to success. With the national focus on college and career readiness, it's important to let your child know that you expect her to put forth her best effort with school work. We know that Junior High means more classes to juggle and more homework assignments to manage. Help your child learn more and be successful in school by getting into a good homework routine from the start. Here's how.

Make homework a habit. One of the best ways to make something a habit is to do it at the same time every day. Help your junior high student to pick a homework time slot that works for him.

Get focused. Encourage your youngster to pick a homework spot where she won't be distracted by siblings or television. Being comfortable with her work environment will let her focus on her assignments.

Keep supplies nearby. A handy stash of school supplies will keep homework time moving along smoothly. Have your child fill a box or basket with everything he needs (paper, pencils, scissors, glue, ruler, graph paper, colored pencils, calculator).

Stay organized. In Junior High, your child has a lot more books and papers to keep straight, so she needs good organization skills. Encourage her to use her agenda (school planner) to keep track of homework due dates, quizzes, and tests, and meeting for group projects.

Manage assignments. Your child's workload might be easier to handle if he starts homework time by putting assignments in order. Some students do better knocking out the easiest assignments first and feeling like they have got something done.

Create study guides. Worksheets, textbook questions, and other assignments contain information your child will need to know for tests. He can stay ahead by making study guides.

Build breaks. Avoid homework burnout by having your child take regular breaks, maybe a 10 minute walk or a healthy snack.

Plan ahead for projects. Teach your child to tackle large projects by breaking it down into individual steps. It won't be so overwhelming.

Turn it in. Homework is not complete until it's handed in!

#### GACTC

The counselors from the Greater Altoona Career and Technology Center (GACTC) will be speaking with all 9th graders in November in the AAJHS auditorium. Students will be viewing a DVD which will exhibit the 27 programs offered at the GACTC. Students will also have the opportunity to sign up to tour the GACTC on November 15th or 16th. Students will select three shops in which they would like to visit.

On the tour, 9<sup>th</sup> grade students will have the opportunity to spend 20 minutes in each shop to gain insight and knowledge of the programs. Students will be able to hear from the instructors and current students about program objectives, duties, certifications, and perspective future jobs. All students, parents and guardians may also attend the **GACTC Open House** on December 4, 2018, from 5:00 –8:00pm.

Each year we have more and more academic and honors students choosing GACTC. We want these students to still take their world language, so these students take summer school to make room on their schedule for a language and GACTC.

#### **Teens and Depression**

The teen years can be a pretty rocky time: full of emotions, hormones, new relationships, and conflicts. It is not uncommon for teens to feel down and out at times. Depression, however, is more than being sad. People with depression are not interested in doing activities that they once enjoyed. Here are some other signs of depression:

Extreme sadness, hopelessness or an empty mood that lasts most of the day and interferes with daily life like going to school or wanting to be with friends. Feeling angrier than usual or trouble with eating or sleeping are other signs.

Symptoms usually last two weeks or more. Depression usually does not go away on its own. It may be caused by a traumatic or stressful event, a chemical imbalance in the brain (lack of serotonin), or even genetics.

The good news is that depression is treatable. Often teens need psychotherapy (talk therapy) and/or medication to overcome depression.

If you think your child may be depressed, please contact your pediatrician or school counselor. Our Student Assistance Intervention Team is also a source of help.

## ENGLISH DEPARTMENT

The leaves are falling, temperatures are dropping, and our teachers and students have settled in to another "spook" tacular school year!

Several ninth-grade English teachers volunteered last year to be early adopters of Reading Workshop, a program designed to instill a love of reading in our students. Based on student choice, Reading Workshop invites students to read more books more often, in school and out, thereby increasing students' stamina for reading, their vocabulary, and in the end their overall reading skills and practices.

Our teacher-volunteers participated in hours upon hours of professional learning last school year, including a week-long boot camp in May, and they will begin practicing the program this year. In grades 7-12, early adopters will begin with an independent novel study focusing on A Deep Study of Character. Parents may anticipate seeing modern young-adult novels coming home with their students. Additionally, two more units of study will occur in book club settings later this school year.

In seventh and eighth grade English, teachers have begun the first year of implementing an updated curriculum aligned with PA Core Standards and Eligible Content. The updated curriculum follows the PA Progressions of Learning and includes the ELA PSSA Glossary to be sure that our students are prepared for each new year of learning in English class.
