

Concerts

Concert participation is strongly encouraged. Most concerts occur outside school hours. The most significant of these are the annual all-district band concerts in January and May. These performances are a wonderful opportunity for a district-wide band to showcase their hard work. Practice

The vast majority of students who feel they are not successful in band fail because of only one reason: they just didn't practice enough! Each instrument requires a unique set of skills that are not natural. They are learned. They must be practiced daily. Students will be expected to practice 15 minutes a day, every day of the week. While students may occasionally miss a day for family activities, etc., these days should be rare. Practice is the key to success in music, especially in the first few formative years. There are no shortcuts. Success is worth the effort!

Selecting and Obtaining an Instrument

Students need to select an instrument that they really want to play. If a student attempts to learn an instrument because an older sibling played it, or because there is one lying around, but the student isn't really interested in that instrument, the chances of success are lowered. Also, students who pick a certain instrument because it's easy to carry often aren't really interested and aren't successful. There have been many successful students who learned on an instrument that seemed bigger than they were at the time. They succeeded because they were genuinely interested.

There are some restrictions on the number of students playing certain instruments. We need a balanced number of instruments across the band, and we also need to consider the needs of the junior high and high school bands. On the attached enrollment form, students should list the three instruments they would like to play in order of interest. Mr. Hallum has the final say on which instruments each student will play, although he will try to stay true to the students' desires.

Instruments can be obtained from any reputable music store. It is suggested that renting rather than purchasing instruments might be prudent for beginning band students. These stores rent instruments and most offer a program in which the rent applies to purchase. Basic rental fees vary. You should contact the stores to check their rental rates.

You may have relatives or friends who have a reasonable quality instrument. You certainly should avail yourself of these if possible. Selecting a quality instrument enhances a student's success. You can't learn to play on a broken instrument, just like you wouldn't learn to drive on a car with four flat tires! A quality instrument is more conducive to your child's success.

Please Note: It is recommended that you avoid purchasing instruments that do not come from a reputable maker. Many of these instruments are made with less quality metals, faulty valves or keys and therefore do not last long. Feel free to ask Mr. Hallum any questions regarding instrument quality and manufacturers.

On the following pages, you will find a list of the suggested cleaning and maintenance supplies that your child should have for each individual instrument. Please take this with you when you rent your instrument to eliminate confusion.

Later in this packet you will find a list of several local music stores. Of course, you may obtain your instrument wherever you like. The district does not endorse any particular music store.

Dropping the Instrumental Music Program

Mr. Hallum would like every student who begins the instrumental music program to finish the year. However, there will be some students who will drop. No students should ever drop before the first eight weeks are over as this is a good interval for students to really investigate what the music program is like. If there is a problem that you would like to discuss, please contact Mr. Lucas. Also remember, if you have a question about instruction in music class, contacting Mr. Lucas directly will get you the quickest response to any concerns you may have. **If a student puts in a good effort and decides that instrumental music is not of interest to them, they may drop by giving a written note, signed by the parent/guardian, to Mr. Hallum.**

Music stores do run out of rental instruments, so it is best to get the instrument and become familiar with it as soon as possible. Please contact Mr. Hallum prior to this date if you have any problems.

Instrument Maintenance and Cleaning Supplies

In addition to your instrument, please look and see what accessories are advised. Take this paper with you to the music store to eliminate confusion! Many stores sell instrument maintenance kits that include all of these listed supplies.

Flute

Cleaning rod
Cleaning cloth for inside of instrument
Plain, soft cloth for polishing outside of instrument
Pencil with eraser

Clarinet

Cork grease
Three #2 size reeds
Reed Guard for storing reeds
Swab cloth or pad saver
Pencil with eraser

Saxophone

Cork grease
Three #2 size reeds
Reed Guard for storing reeds
Swab cleaner or pad saver
Pencil with eraser

Trumpet

Valve oil
Tuning slide grease
Mouthpiece brush
Cleaning snake
Plain, soft cloth for polishing outside of instrument
Pencil with eraser

Trombone

Slide Oil
Tuning slide grease
Mouthpiece brush
Cleaning snake
Plain, soft cloth for polishing outside of instrument
Pencil with eraser

All students will be using the book *Measures of Success Book One* for their instrument. It should be available at any music store or online.

For all instruments, a wire, foldable music stand for home practice is highly recommended!!!

Many music stores teach private lessons. Lessons are always a good idea, and can greatly improve the student's level of success.
