# From the Chief

The Honorable Mayor W.T. Daniels;

Dear Mayor Daniels,

The Greeneville Police Department is pleased to present the 2019 Annual Report of our activities and achievements. We take great pride in our efforts to achieve our Mission and fulfill our Vision, and this report chronicles those efforts.

2019 presented the Department with never before faced challenges, opportunities for growth, and the embracing of new ways for us to serve our community. Through all these things, The Greeneville Police Department was blessed with the support of our Mayor and Aldermen, Community, and Peers. We were faced with answering 24,498 calls for service for our Community, a number that is very similar to the number of calls for 2018, but in 2019 we made 2,266 arrests, up 44.15% from 2018. GPD officers issued 9,562 citations, a 21.7% increase. 802 traffic crashes were recorded with only 135 of those involving injury, down from 162 in 2018. Two of these crashes resulted in fatalities. At the time of this report, TBI has not published the 2019 Crime Report which will include the department's clearance rates.


As reported in 2018, The Greeneville Police Department was Accredited through the Tennessee Association of Chiefs of Police and 2019 saw the Department work to meet those standards and begin the preparation for re-accreditation. The Department expanded our participation in TACP activities, to include participation in Legislative Review Workshop, LEACT, Professional Standards Committee, False Alarm Committee, and 911 Committee.

## Achievements

### FBI National Academy



On March 15, 2019 Lieutenant Josh Pierce graduated from the 275<sup>th</sup> session of the FBI National Academy in Quantico, VA. Lt. Pierce was one of 251 law enforcement officers from 47 states and 13 countries to complete the 275<sup>th</sup> session of the academy. The 10-week program offered advanced communication, leadership, and fitness training. Mayor Daniels presented Lt. Pierce with the FBINA uniform pin. Assistant Chief Crum, in turn, pinned his uniform. Pierce joins Crum and Captain Hixson as FBINA alumni.

### International Association of Chiefs of Police

On October 26-29, 2019 Assistant Chief Mike Crum, along with Information Technology Chief, Matt Hughes, attended the International Association of Chiefs of Police Annual Conference and Exposition (IACP) in Chicago, IL. According to their website, the IACP is, “the world’s largest and most influential professional association for police leaders. With more than 30,000 members in over 160 countries, the IACP is a recognized leader in global policing, committed to advancing safer communities through thoughtful, progressive police leadership.”

The four-day conference was capped by a keynote speech by President Donald J. Trump. Crum witnessed the President sign an Executive Order establishing a new executive Commission on Law Enforcement. Retired Chief Phil Keith along with current TBI Director David Rausch have both been named by the President to this commission. “It was an outstanding privilege and honor alone just to hear the President speak but to have two friends and supporters of GPD to be appointed to the commission is outstanding” Crum said.

### **IACP Exhibit is Unprecedented:**

The vendor and exhibit hall for IACP is like none other. The Mobile Command Center shown is a mirror image of the TBI Mobile Command Center. Crum added “there were four more of these, 5 helicopters, way too many vehicles to number. It was amazing!”

“The experience and information I have been able to bring back to GPD has already proven invaluable. As COVID-19 hit, I was able to get a template for an operations plan for such an incident. I took the template and adapted it to Greeneville’s needs. I don’t know of anywhere else I could have gained this. I have drawn attention to the big items, but software and officer safety vendors covered the floor of the conference center! As a part of my training, I was given an opportunity to spend an hour, one on one with the PIO from Joplin MO. A tremendous experience! I was able to attend the IACP 2019 via a grant from TN Association Chiefs of Police (TACP). TACP covered 100% of my costs. Several from GPD’s command staff have applied for the same grant for IACP 2020.” *Mike Crum*

## **Department Divisions**

### **Patrol Division**

We currently have four shifts that provide twenty four hour coverage. They work a 12 hour shift (7am-7pm or 7pm-7am) and rotate between the two during a 28 day scheduled cycle. Our Patrol Division is often referred to as the backbone of the department. They are often the first contact a citizen has with the Police Department. They complete accident and incident reports along with other investigations. Most of the department's overall arrests and the greatest number of personal contacts with the public are made by the uniform patrol officers as they patrol, control traffic, and enforce the vehicle and traffic and penal laws. The presence of a uniformed patrol officer usually nullifies any criminal activity in the area due to the high profile of their uniform and the high visibility of the marked patrol car.

### **Traffic Division**

The Traffic Unit consists of two fulltime officers. Officer Eddie Short and Officer John Bishop were assigned to the Traffic Unit to start the year. After Officer Bishop's promotion to Lieutenant he was replaced by Officer Justin House. Officer House is also a Field Training Officer and a portion of his time is dedicated towards training new officers that are hired by the Police Department.

### **Special Response Team**

The Special Response Team (S.R.T.) is a vital part of the Greeneville Police Department and an asset to the citizens of Greeneville. This specialized group is comprised of officers from the Greeneville Police Department. The Special Response Team employs a variety of special weapons and tactics not available to the regular patrolman. This unit is activated for a variety of reasons including barricaded suspects, hostage situations, and serving high risk warrants. The members of the Special Response Team conduct regular training as well as attend specialized training sessions with other Special Response Team and Special Weapons And Tactics (S.W.A.T.) teams. Many of the specifics of the Special Response Team are kept confidential and not available to the public.

### **School Resource Officer**

The Greeneville Police Department currently utilizes full-time sworn officers to provide School Resource Officer (SRO) services in the Greeneville City Schools. Officer Brian Moore is assigned to Greeneville High School as a permanent assignment. Officer Kevin Guinn is assigned to the Greene Technology Center, as is Officer Charles Story on a permanent basis.

In 2019 we had Officers Louis Calobrisi, James Craft, Chris Metcalf, and Sgt. Joseph Prokop who rotate between the four city elementary schools weekly. The School Resource Officer

Program is very successful based on the Greeneville City School's and Community feedback. The relationships formed between Law Enforcement and the students have become very evident in our communities.

## **K-9 Division**

The Greeneville Police Department K-9 unit currently consists of 4 officer / K-9 teams. Kajo patrols with Lt. Cameron Spradlin. Kid patrols with Officer Eric Davis, Ace patrols with Lt. Eddie Key and Kojak patrols with Officer Shawn Hinkle. The K-9's are German Shepherds or Malinois trained in narcotic detection and patrol. Specifically, they are trained to detect marijuana, methamphetamine, cocaine, and heroin. The Officer and K-9 form a strong bond due to the numerous hours spent together both on and off duty.



## **Bomb Squad**

The Greeneville Police Department Bomb Squad has been an integral part of the Greeneville Police Department. The Bomb Squad safely disposes of hazardous devices, inspects suspect packages, and removes old or unsafe explosives that have been discovered by citizens. The Bomb Squad assists in special events such as the Bristol Motor Speedway National Association for Stock Car Auto Racing (NASCAR) events. The Greeneville Police Department Bomb Squad supports several area Bomb Squads including those located in Kingsport, Johnson City, and Morristown, TN.

The Greeneville Police Department Bomb Squad Officers are Accredited Bomb Technicians that receive training at the Federal Bureau of Investigations (F.B.I.) Hazardous Devices School in Huntsville, Alabama. Each Officer assigned to this unit is required to attend a six-week basic training course. In addition, each Officer on the Bomb Squad attends a 40 hour re-certification every three years. The Officers also are required to attend a monthly 16 hour training session.

### **Criminal Investigation Division**

The Criminal Investigation Division is a specialized division with the responsibility of handling criminal investigations which require special expertise, or because of their complexity, cannot readily be completed by patrol officers. The Criminal Investigation Division is responsible for conducting follow-up investigations committed within the Department's jurisdiction and assisting the District Attorney General's office in the prosecution of criminal cases.

In 2019 a total of 226 cases were assigned to investigators. Ninety-four, or 41.6%, of those cases were closed by arrest, exceptional clearance, or the offense was determined to be non-reportable. There was 1 homicide case, which was solved and warrants were issued, however then suspect is incarcerated in Florida. Extradition of suspect will take place once suspects cases in Florida are completed.

### **Drug Task Force**

The Greeneville Police Department participates in the 3rd Judicial Drug Task force under the authority of the 3rd Judicial District Attorney, Dan Armstrong. The Task Force is compiled of officers from Greeneville PD, Greene County SO, Hawkins County SO, and Surgoinsville PD.

The Third Judicial District Drug and Violent Crimes Task Force covers a large area of North Eastern Tennessee. The counties covered are Greene, Hawkins, Hamblen, and Hancock which are all mostly rural areas. In the area covered by the task force, we continue to see a large problem with the abuse of pharmaceutical narcotics and the diversion of the same. In the last five years, our area has been inundated with a large amount of crystal methamphetamine a.k.a. ICE. This is becoming a problem in all the counties served by the task force as well as the judicial districts which adjoin our counties. The Third District Drug and Violent Crime Task Force exist to combat the narcotics trafficking within the Third Judicial District. The task force is needed because narcotic traffickers often cross jurisdictional boundaries to avoid detection.

The task force holds jurisdiction in all four counties within the Third Judicial District. The task force also works with other task forces as well as state and federal agencies to combat the ever-changing narcotics trade environment. As in any undertaking such as this, the ability to quickly adjust to the actions of those who seek to damage our communities through the sale and distribution of narcotics and the use of violence.

In 2019, the D.T.F. worked 137 cases with 34 seizures totaling approximately \$121,500.00 in seized assets and 14 vehicle seizures.

### **Auxiliary Police**

Our Auxiliary Unit consists of 18 Officers that work on a part-time basis. Their primary function and assignment is to work weekends along with a fulltime Patrol Officer and also work special events. Some of those events consist of: The Greene County Fair, Ballgames, and extracurricular school events of Greeneville High and Greeneville Middle Schools, Holiday Celebrations, parades, and they assist with several extra duty assignments.

### **Reports/ Records Checks**

The Greeneville Police Department has 2 clerks in the records department, Tina Jeffers, and Josh Evans. Our records clerks were full time police officers before transitioning to the records department. Their office hours are 8 am- 5 pm Monday through Friday. Our records department can help the community with matters such as:

Obtaining copies of accident reports or offense reports completed by the Greeneville Police Department.

Payments of Traffic Citations.

Payments of Parking Tickets.

Obtaining a Beer Card.

Obtaining a Greeneville Police Department records check.

Finding out Traffic Court information and dates.

Scheduling Driving School appointments.

# Innovation and Growth

## Move to Central Dispatch



Greene County 911 transformed from dream to reality in 1993. 2019 witnessed a tremendous amount of hard work by multiple agencies, which paid off with the beginning phase of transitioning to central dispatch. GPD officers moved dispatch to the 911 building and have spent the last year in communication and training with 911 dispatchers. Dispatch is on track to take over PD dispatch completely in July 2020.

## GPD adds 13 new Ford Interceptor Sedans



A monumental move was supported by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen in which it was authorized to purchase 13 new Ford Interceptor Sedans. This brought GPD up to industry standard by assigning officers their take home vehicles. A great deal of research was put into this project, and based on the 2021 vehicle price it was revealed that by authorizing the purchase of all 13 at once, the Town would net a \$56,000 savings over the

next three years,. The department has already seen a specific benefit by having essentially two shifts working in all areas of the town during shift change. Not only are we able to meet the industry standard, but we have also witnessed a tremendous amount of pride that the officers are showing by taking good care of their vehicles. This program has provided officers with a tremendously needed and important tool for their Law Enforcement toolbox. This program definitely fulfills or our desire to demonstrate that our actions meet and illustrate our Mission & Vision Statements.




