


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## Educator Survey




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## Wildcat Soccer gets behind scenes look at Memphis 901 FC

Coach John Duke of the Fayette Ware Soccer Wildcats took four of the Wildcat soccer players down to AutoZone Park for a tour of the Memphis professional soccer team 901 FC facilities on Thursday March 7th.
