PrepareRI Youth Apprenticeship Applications due by April 30th!

The PrepareRI Youth Apprenticeship program is an opportunity for Rhode Island students (entering 12th grade in Fall 2019) to start a pathway directly into a career while still in high school. The program combines a classroom component and a work-based learning component, leading to a paid, full-time job and/or paid Registered Apprenticeship upon successful completion. Through CCRI's Running Start program, students will take college-level courses at CCRI their senior year to build employer-demanded technical skills, meet high school graduation requirements, and earn college credit. There are four high-demand pathways available during this pilot year:

- Pharmacy Technician
- Medical Assistant
- Process Technologist
- Horticultural and Landscape Technician

RIC GenCyber is the first and only GenCyber camp in Rhode Island. Since it is fully sponsored by the NSA and NSF, it is free of charge. We will meet between 8:30-4:30 on July 8-12, 2019. To attend the camp, you must commit to being on campus during this time. Campers must provide their own transportation to and from camp and must commit to being on-time. Bus tickets are also available free of charge. Breakfast, lunch and other goodies will be provided. This year we have chosen the following topics:

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Each lesson has something for everyone. We offer a combination of individual, pair/small group and whole class instruction. We offer a combination of hands-on activities and unplugged computer activities that students enjoy.

1. Registration will remain first-come-first-serve so please register as soon as possible if you are interested in taking a course.
2. Students will be eligible to take one course over the summer and no more than two courses for the fall semester.
3. Students will receive dual credit (typically one credit for NKHS and either 3 or 4 college credits).
4. Students in the class of 2019 are not eligible to take an ACN course this summer or next fall.

Please consider taking a course as these courses help students get a hard start on post-secondary success, master the skills required of a lifelong learner and be prepared for jobs in sectors critical to Rhode Island's future prosperity.

Guidance Information

Career Speakers

The NKHS Guidance Department is sponsoring a career speaker series that will take place during the last week of March through the end of May. Various community members will be visiting our high school to discuss their profession. Please take a look at the attached document that lists the speakers that will be here during the month of May. If you are interested in attending a session, please come to guidance to sign up. A pass will be given to you during advisory, however, you must have permission to miss advisory/class from your teacher. You are responsible for all missed work. These sessions will last approximately 30 minutes.

Scheduling

Counselors met with students in grades 9-11 one on one during the first three weeks of March to review teacher recommendations, answer scheduling questions, and to input course requests. Please note you will not be able to see the elective choices until we publish again which will be in the mid-April time frame. This is the first step in the scheduling process. Elective courses are tentative until the master schedule is finalized in June. Override forms are due in the Guidance Office by April 5th.

Cap and Gown Orders

An email is being sent to all seniors regarding the options for purchasing a graduation cap and gown for the June ceremony. There are many options for “extras”, but students should be aware that all that is required is the basic \$40 for the cap, gown, and tassel. You will find this option at the bottom of the order form for individual items that is attached to the email. The extra tassel in the \$52.50 package is a nice souvenir but students will not be allowed to wear them on graduation day. Some parents have asked about reusing recent (within the past five years) cap and gowns. Please be cautious about reuse as the gowns are ordered based on height and weight, therefore you do not want your student to stand out because their gown is too short or too

Final Exam Schedules

Final exams are held the last four to five days of the school year, and students are expected to be present. Please remember to leave plenty of time for calendar adjustments for snow days. As a reminder, family vacations, or other activities that could have been scheduled for after the exam times, are not excused absences. Weddings, graduations or other special occasions over which families have little control in scheduling will be considered, but please make your request for excusal as soon as possible. For students who do have excused absences for final exams, make ups will be provided during the summer months by appointment. There will be no provision for early exams, and all exams must be make up by August 1st in order to update the transcript in time for the new school year.

Please log in to your Aspen Family Portal/Aspen Student Portal to review your child's course requests for the 2019-2020 school year. This report includes teacher recommendations for core classes, electives your child requested and alternates he/she chose. If your child does not see a class he/she signed up for, the class was likely cancelled due to under enrollment. As a reminder, this is not your child's schedule as the master schedule is in the process of being built. Please keep in mind that students do not receive credit for Personalized Learning Time (PLT).

This report can be found on the Pages top tab in the area of the page called Published Reports. Information regarding course descriptions and graduation requirements can be found in the Program of Studies under the “academics” tab on the high school website.

FAQ:

1. How many credits should I see on my child's course request sheet?

7 credits if they are requesting 2 PLTs (one per semester), 7.5 credits if they are requesting 1 PLT or 8 credits if they are not requesting any PLTs. Please keep in mind that underclassmen may be assigned a PLT if there are not any seats in one of their chosen electives. Rising seniors can request 6 or 6.5 credits, however, he/she must have approval from administration in order to fall below 7 credits.

1. My rising senior has requested off-role (arriving after first period or leaving at the end of third period), however, I do not see this on his/her course requests.

Student needs to complete an off-role application which requires parent approval. The form is turned in to Mrs. Sweet's office for consideration. Once student is approved, counselor will drop PLT(s) and add off-role to student course requests.

1. What do the Y and N signify in the recommended column?

Y means they were recommended for course by his/her teacher, N means he/she elected to request the course. One exception is if teacher submitted a level teacher change request form for a core subject.

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1. **What do the Y and N signify in the alternate column?** Y means this is an alternate elective your child chose in case he/she does not get his/her first choice.
 2. **My child submitted an override form to change levels, however, I do not see this on his/her course requests sheet.** All overrides will be addressed once final grades are computed which will be in late June. Guidance counselors will notify student if he/she is able to move up level(s).
 3. **Will the courses I see on my child's course request sheet be the courses that will be on his/her schedule for 2019-2020 school year?** The master schedule has not been built as of yet, therefore there is no guarantee this will be your child's schedule. However, all students will be guaranteed a seat in their core subjects (Math, English, Science and History).
 4. **What does SA, CP, H, and AP stand for?** NKHS offers various levels based on a student's ability. SA stands for Success Academy, CP is College Prep, H is honors and AP is Advanced Placement.
 5. **What if my child fails a core subject for the 2018-2019 school year?** If your child is eligible to go to summer school (English and Math only) and successfully completes the summer school course, he/she will be placed in the next sequential course. If your child is

not eligible to go to summer school and/or fails History, Science or World Language, your child's schedule will change.

9. I have questions about my child's course requests. Who should I contact? If your question is regarding elective choices, please contact your child's guidance counselor. If your question is regarding level placement in one of the core subject areas, please contact your child's teacher.

Change in semester 2 protocols for students

Starting in the second semester (January 28th) students will no longer be able to have backpacks and coats in their last period classes. We have altered our schedule slightly to give students two additional minutes at the end of the day before buses leave to get their items. This time will not impact instructional time.

Students are asked to get all of their items at the end of the school day. We will hold buses for the first few days as students get use to the new pattern.

The other change in protocol is that students will only be allowed in one of three entrances at the start of the school day. Students can access the Main Office doors for bus drop off, the rear set of doors near the Senior Lot and drop off zone in the back of the school and by the Weight Room for those students coming up from the Junior Lot. All other entrances will be locked.

Attendance Counts:

NKHS was VERY pleased to be given a 5 STAR rating on RIDE Accountability report card. However, it was noted that NKHS has a chronic absence rate of 11% of students beyond the acceptable 18 days absent. Let's please try to be diligent about consistent attendance.

As we approach cold and flu season, please be mindful of absences. It takes just two days per month to be truant. If a student is ill and contagious, then keep them home.

Once a student has accumulated 5 days, a letter is automatically generated. The letter serves several purposes. First, is to increase communication between home and school about attendance. It also provides an opportunity to correct any errors in a timely fashion. Please bring doctor's notes with three days of scheduled appointment. If you receive a letter and have questions, feel free to call the Student Services office. Additionally, if you have documentation that needs to be submitted, the letter will be a nice reminder.
