With 22 regular K-6 education classrooms, 3 special day classrooms, 5 Junior High classrooms, and one science lab. The junior high classroom (including 1 Special Education Office, 1 administrative office, two student bathrooms, and one staff restroom) were finalized in 2018. The auditorium/cafeteria was repainted and a new flooring system was completed in the summer of 2019. A kindergarten playground was also added during the Summer of 2018 during the Junior High expansion project. Students are provided a safe, orderly environment in which to learn.

School Safety Plan (School Year 2019-20)

Peggy Heller's comprehensive Safety Plan includes an Emergency Preparedness Committee that is trained to respond quickly and efficiently to any safety threat to our campus. Furthermore, every staff member on campus has a specific role to play in the event of an emergency and is equipped with the proper material to carry out their part of the plan. From Emergency Backpacks to student information kits, and evacuation materials, each staff member has their supplies kept in a visual and accessible location. Guests on campus such as substitutes are provided with information on how to react to specific emergencies on campus, and maps with evacuation routes are located in all buildings and classrooms. Staff and students practice drills such as Fire, Evacuation, A.L.i.C.E, Earthquake, AED, and Lockdown each year. The last safety plan meeting was October 4th, 2019. The School Safety Plan was submitted to the board for approval on October 8th, 2019, and was approved by the School Board on November 12th, 2019. School Site Council also reviews the site plan each year. At Peggy Heller School, we believe meaningful learning must occur in a safe, disciplined, and positive environment. To achieve such an environment, a set of expectations for student behavior, attendance, and dress has been established. Student dress code and consequences for inappropriate behavior are outlined in the student handbook/agenda. The rules/expectations are distributed at the beginning of each school year and when a new student enrolls. Supervision is provided by classroom teachers, campus supervisors, instructional assistants, and the administrative staff.

Teachers participate in grade level collaboration trainings each year. They are also released by substitute teachers to receive additional training during the school year. After school and summer optional trainings are also offered. During the last three school years, teachers have been provided on-going professional development in the areas of: objectives, Depth of Knowledge, class engagement, CAASPP and ELPAC assessments, English Language Development, reading trainings, Illuminate platform for district assessments, and special education. Professional development sessions for teachers this year focus on English Language Learners and Math Number Talks.

The district has three instructional coaches to help all teachers with ELA and Math assessments. School sites participate in site specific professional development, based on their data, during weekly Professional Learning Communities (PLC) meetings. All schools participate in grade level academic conferencing pull out days for teachers to discuss student progress, data, and future instruction, based upon the data gathered. In addition, new teachers to the district receive another layer of support with the Induction Program. This includes two days of trainings, after-school trainings, visiting other classrooms in the district with their induction mentor.
