Which type of book am I reading?

Fiction Book – Any book that is a made up story. (Ex. Harry Potter, Pete the Cat)

Non-fiction Book – Books that teach you facts about subjects. (Babe Ruth, Horses)

3 – Author's Name

2 – Title of the book you read

4 – Both questions answered thoroughly

Entering First Grade in August 2018

Option One

1. Name the characters.
2. What happened in the beginning?

Option Two

1. Name the characters.
2. What happened at the end?

Entering Second Grade in August 2018

Fiction

1. How would you describe the main character? Why?
2. What was the problem in the book? What was the solution?

Non-Fiction

1. What is the main idea of this text? State a supporting detail.
2. Why did the author write this book? What makes you think this?

Entering Third Grade in August 2018

Fiction

1. What is another good title for this story? Use details from the story in your answer.

2. What is the problem in the story? How is the problem solved? Use details from the story in your answer.

Non-fiction

1. Explain why the author wrote this book. Use details from the story in your answer.
2. What are three new facts that you learned in this story? Use details from the story in your answer.

Entering Fourth Grade in August 2018

Fiction

1. Who are the major characters in the book?
2. Describe the setting of the story.

Non-fiction

1. What is the main idea of the book?
2. What details in the book are important?

Entering Fifth Grade in August 2018

Fiction

1. Select two (2) characters that have something in common. Explain in detail (using information from the text) what it is they have in common.
2. What is the conflict in the book? (Hint: Conflict is the problem.) Remember to include details from the book.

Non- Fiction

1. What is the main idea of the book?
2. What details in the book are important?

Entering Sixth Grade in August 2018

Fiction

1. Select two (2) characters that have something in common. Explain in detail (using information from the text) what it is they have in common.
2. Describe the mood of the story. Give specific details from the text that show/tell the mood. (Hint: The mood is the feeling you get while reading the story. Examples: joy, anger, sorrow, etc.)

Non-fiction

1. What kind of research did the author have to do to write this information?
2. Would this book or information be different if it were written ten years ago? Why?
