**Choice B:** You may choose to answer the following eight prompts/questions in a more creative manner. Some suggestions are to create a book jacket, a one-page newspaper article, a movie poster, a comic strip, radio or TV broadcast, or by using technology. Make sure you include your name, the book title, and the author. Just remember to include the answers to all of the following eight prompts/questions.

**\*All of the following prompts/questions must be addressed:**

1. Who are the main characters? Describe them.
2. Where does the story take place? (Setting)
3. What is the problem in the story and how was it solved?
4. What are the main events of the story?
5. How did the story end? (Conclusion)
6. What was your favorite part of the story and why?
7. Which character would you choose to be your friend and why?
8. Would you recommend this book to a friend? Why or why not?

**2.) Required:** Summer Journal- Minimum of 7 entries (you might want to do one per week)  
Please demonstrate the excellent writing skills that you learned in fourth grade. It is up to you about what you would like to write. Each entry should include the date and be at a minimum of one paragraph long. You might want to include drawings or pictures. Be creative! I want you to enjoy this!

When turning this in please make sure your name is on it and that all your entries are neatly put together (Ex: stapled together or if you created a book you folded all the pages together).

\*Ideas: maybe write about a fun trip, a play date, a movie you watched, perhaps even what you wish you were doing, what you are looking forward to doing, etc. If you don't want to write about the summer, you can create a short story. Just make sure that you include a minimum of 7 entries.
