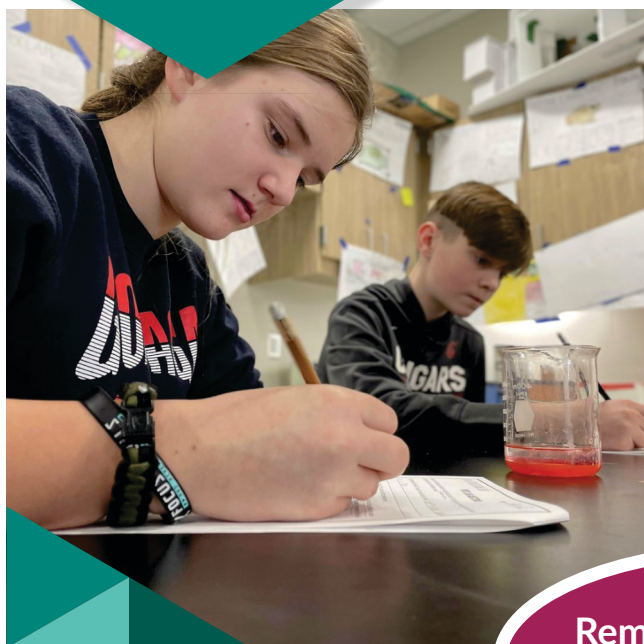

Educational Programs & Operations (EPO) Replacement Levy

The EPO Levy sustains essential programs and activities – not funded by state and federal dollars – for engaging students and ensuring a safe learning environment. Exceptional levels of student achievement are directly tied to school programs paid for by the levy. In order to sustain these programs, a voter-approved replacement EPO levy is required. CVSD has had a voter-approved EPO levy in place for more than 50 years.

Voters approved a three-year EPO levy in 2021 with an estimated rate at \$2.40 per thousand of assessed home value at that time. CVSD is asking to renew the levy at an estimated rate of \$2.40 per thousand again. Because of increased valuations and housing growth within the district, the EPO rate is actually currently reduced to \$1.91 per thousand.

This 3-year replacement levy would pay for:



Teachers, counselors, nurses and support staff

- Staffing needed beyond what the state funds:
- ♦ Teachers and learning support
 - ♦ Nurses, counselors, social workers
 - ♦ Nutrition and transportation staff



Special education programs

- ♦ Student interventions and supports: filling the gap between program costs and funding



Safety and security staff

- ♦ Resource deputies and officers
- ♦ Crossing guards, playground supervisors and school assistants



Building maintenance & staff

- ♦ Facilities maintenance, grounds keeping and custodians
- ♦ Utilities, fuel and insurance



Arts, athletics, clubs & more

- ♦ Academics, advanced courses, STEM
- ♦ Fine arts, music, drama
- ♦ After-school activities
- ♦ Athletics and clubs, debate and the like



Curriculum & materials

- ♦ Textbooks, teaching, professional development and instructional materials

Capital Safety, Facilities and Technology Improvements Levy

Voters will consider a six-year Capital Safety, Facilities and Technology Improvements Levy to pay for improvements to safety and security (including creating safer vestibule entrances), playgrounds and surfaces, roofing, flooring, HVAC heating/cooling systems, stadium lighting, technology upgrades and student devices.

Technology improvements would include replacement of over 16,000 student Chromebooks, iPads, district wireless access points, phone systems, staff devices and classroom instructional equipment. The district would also replace broken security cameras, access control components and building alarm equipment, while maintaining current standard of safety in the buildings.

This 6-year improvements levy would pay for:



Safety & security improvements

- ◆ Improving school entryways, access controls, security systems and cameras
- ◆ Alarms, fire protection and communications systems



Building and playground improvements

- ◆ Improving HVAC heating/cooling systems
- ◆ Repairing roofs and flooring
- ◆ Repairing & improving playgrounds, pavement and sidewalks
- ◆ Improving lighting, including stadium lights



Upgraded technology

- ◆ Upgrading computers, wireless networks, other technology equipment and infrastructure, and training to implement improvements

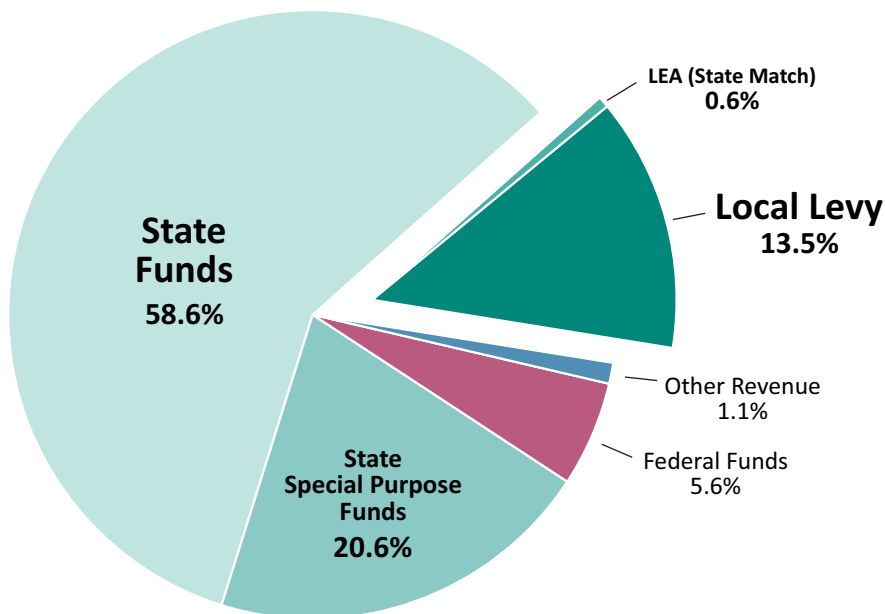
