EXTRAORDINARY MINISTERS OF HOLY COMMUNION Having received training in the spring of junior year, these seniors serve the St. Dominic school community as Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. Their service includes distributing Holy Communion at any grade school and high school Mass throughout the year.

FBLA (FUTURE BUSINESS LEADERS OF AMERICA) Members of the FBLA have the opportunity to compete in various competitions at local colleges throughout the school year. These competitions build confidence and help prepare the students for careers in business. Students also work in the school store, participate in fundraising for a charity of our choice, and are involved in many other chapter functions. Meetings are held once per week for ½ hour to 1 hour.

HEALTH & SCIENCE CAREERS CLUB Health and Science Careers Club is for anyone who is interested in pursuing a career in the medical or science fields. Meetings will be held once a month. There will be guest speakers and the opportunity to work alongside medical professionals.

The Club will meet bi-weekly for about an hour. Other activities include: Field trips to museums, foreign language movie theaters, Radio Stations etc.

****INTERACT** Interact is a community-service based club composed of students who are devoted to better their school and community. Members of this club pride themselves on helping and serving their peers, the St. Dominic Community and various organizations. Specific club projects include the Breast Cancer Walk at Jones Beach, Midnight Run, Bowling for Brain Injuries Fundraiser and Light it Up Blue for Autism Awareness. The club meets bi-weekly on Wednesdays from 2:40 – 3:30 p.m.

JAZZ BAND Jazz Band is after school music ensemble consisting of a rhythm section (guitar, bass, piano, and drumset) as well as brass and woodwind instruments.

Music selection typically includes Jazz, Swing, and Popular music. The ensemble performs at the Christmas and Spring Concerts, as well as extra events. Auditions are in the fall.

MATH CLUB Math Club is open to students of all grades and meets once a month to compete in local and national math contests. Its primary goal is to provide challenging mathematics problems for the academic enrichment of students.

MOCK TRIAL Mock Trial is a nationwide activity in which students simulate American proceedings. Students represent both sides of cases, acting as both the defense and prosecution, with evidence, witness affidavits, statutes, and case law. Students can build skills and confidence in public speaking and debate, while learning about trial advocacy and the American Judicial System.

MODEL UNITED NATIONS Model UN is a simulation of United Nations and other international bodies, which allows students to take on the roles of diplomats around the world. Model UN seeks to promote awareness of the many issues facing the international community, and to give students the opportunity to engage in critical thinking about how to address those issues.

PHILOSOPHY CLUB The purpose is to join our forces into finding the truth about our world and universe in order to live a better purposeful life. We would like our students to engage more in the world of ideas, to know more on the great thinkers through the ages such as Socrates, Plato, Aristotle, etc. They would benefit to see the world and life more philosophically in the hope of becoming more open minded on their choices for the future.

PHOTO CLUB The Photo Club offers members the opportunity to learn, practice and improve their photographic skills. After learning the fundamentals, students will apply their skills through various projects such as photographing school

events, using photo editing software, entering photography contests, and participating in local nature photography field trips. Members will share their photos with the school community through the school website.

ROBOTICS CLUB The mission of the St. Dominic High School Robotics Club is to provide students a place to pursue their interest in both mechanical, electronic, and software design by working on large and small scale robotics projects. Teams within the club will design, build, and program functioning robots using a variety of resources. Our club aligns itself with the goals of the organization FIRST® (For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology), a not-for-profit charity founded to inspire children's interests in science, technology and engineering

SCIENCE OLYMPIADS Challenges students in STEM fields like chemistry, physics, engineering, and biology. Students sign up to compete in specific events and will participate in one of two competitions. Practices will be held to prepare for the December Islip Invitational Competition and the February Wantagh Regional Competition.

SIGN LANGUAGE CLUB Sign Language Club invites all students to participate in learning a unique language in using signs and symbols instead of sound. All are welcomed to learn in expressing themselves in a very meaningful and significant way which is diverse and challenging from other languages.

STUDENT COUNCIL The governing body of St. Dominic's which acts as a liaison between the students and the administration. It fosters school spirit through a variety of activities, including but not limited to freshman orientation, blue & white events, homecoming, and pep rally. Students may become involved by running for and winning an executive or general board position or being a general member of the club. Students do not need to be a member of the Student Council to attend a meeting and voice their concerns and share their ideas. Meetings are held once a week until all business is discussed.
