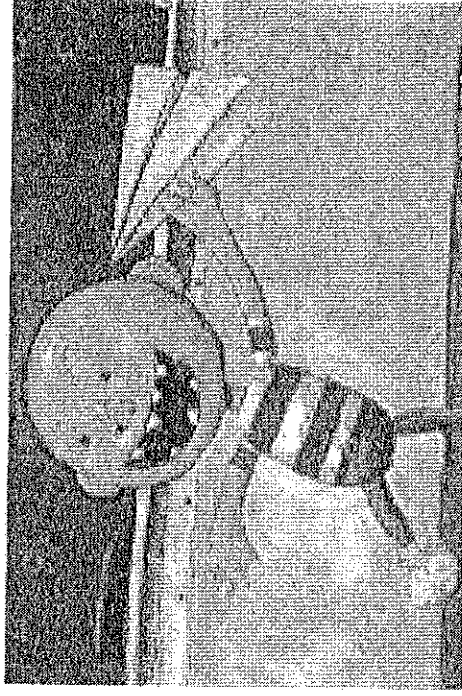

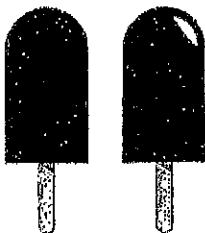
Dear Parents,

(Level 1 books are for students who have reading challenges -- readability 2nd and 3rd grade level. Level 2 books are for students who read near grade level -- readability 4th and 5th grade level. Level 3 books are for students who excel at reading -- readability - 6th grade level or higher.)

Level 1 Books

Fiction

- Hopkinson: *Abe Lincoln Crosses a Creek: A Tall, Thin Tale* (Introducing His Forgotten Frontier Friend) c2008 historical fiction In Knob Creek, Kentucky, in 1816, seven-year-old Abe Lincoln falls into a creek and is rescued by his best friend.
- Sachar: *Marvin Redpost* series fiction Marvin Redpost encounters hilarious problems with school, family and friends.
- Warner: *Only Emma* c2005 fiction Emma's mother loses her job, so Emma becomes the new kid in the school and neighborhood. An only child, Emma's life changes when a four year old comes for a visit
- Clements: *Lunch Money* c1994 school, humor Hart is a popular boy who sometimes "goofs off". When he hits the music teacher with a rubber band, he is put in charge of the holiday concert. Both Hart and his teacher learn lessons.
- Gutman: *My Weird School* school, humor A fun series of books about school life that appeal to reluctant readers

Nonfiction

- **Biebow : *The Crayon Man: The True Story of the Invention of Crayola Crayons***: You may not have heard of Edwin Binney but chances are you've used his invention: Crayola crayons. Binney's determination to come up with ways for children to create and draw with non-dusty color led to the invention. His life and legacy (and even how the name Crayola was crafted) makes a memorable story. Illustrated in color and brought right up to contemporary crayon making, this is a fascinating and well documented look at one man's continuing legacy.
- **Foreman: *Stubby: A True Story of Friendship*** A young soldier narrates the story of how he met a podgy pudgy dog soon named Stubby. Stubby and Corporal Conroy soon became inseparable friends and more; Stubby was adopted into Conroy's regiment to become a heroic soldier in his own right. This true story of World War I is illustrated in light hues with gentle lines, accompanied by a straightforward text. An afterward includes a photo of Stubby and provides a bit of additional information.
- **Fishman: *Power Up*** Millions of refrigerators, TVs, schools and stoplights can be powered by the energy held in one person's pinky finger. So why can't you power your toys? "... because your body needs all the energy it's got." This unique look at the human body's systems and the energy required to run them is presented in accessible language and darkly hued, strong illustrations.
- **Manley: *Just Right: Searching for the Goldilocks Planet*** A girl gazes out a window, staring at the nighttime sky. From early times, people like Lucretius, Teng Mu, Giordano Bruno and Christiaan Huygens believed that other worlds exist. When the young girl and her family visit a museum, she too wonders, and later continues to look out at the nighttime sky. Realistic illustrations effectively combine with the accessible, informative text.

Level 2 Books

Fiction

- **Lupica: *Two-Minute Drill*** c2007 dyslexia, football stories Brainy Scott, a great kicker who otherwise struggles with football, and star quarterback Chris, who has dyslexia, team up to help each other succeed in both football and school.
- **Smith: *Bone*** c2004 graphic novel Three cousins leave their home of Boneville. On their journey they meet royalty, dragons, and monsters as they try to return home.
- **DiCamillo: *The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane*** c2006 fantasy Edward Tulane is a selfish, thoughtless toy rabbit until he loses the little girl who loves him.
- **Clements: *We the Children* series** c2010 mystery Sixth-grader Ben Pratt's life is full of changes that he does not like but when the school janitor gives him a tarnished coin with some old engravings and then dies, Ben is drawn into an effort to keep the school from being destroyed.
- **Lowry: *The Willoughbys*** c2008 family life, humorous stories A tongue-in-cheek take on classic themes in children's literature, in which the four Willoughby children set out to become "deserving orphans" after their neglectful parents embark on a treacherous around-the-world adventure, leaving them in the care of an odious nanny.

Nonfiction

- Grimes: *Talkin' About Bessie* c2002 biography, ethnic diversity How Bessie Coleman became the first African-American woman to become a licensed pilot as told by her family and friends.
- Kehret: *Shelter Dogs: Amazing Stories of Adopted Strays* c1999 animals, non-fiction Tells the story of 8 dogs who were saved from the animal shelter and went on to better lives.
- Garland: *Two Men and a Car: Franklin Roosevelt, Al Capone, and a Cadillac V-8* What did President Franklin D. Roosevelt have in common with the notorious gangster, Al Capone? It just might have been a car; specifically a bulletproof Cadillac with a V-8 engine. How these men diverged is presented anecdotally with a touch of speculation but in a highly engaging, readable style. Scratchboard illustrations and concluding back matter includes a timeline, additional resources and a few photographs.
- Viola: *Polar Bears Survival on the Ice* Join two curious polar bear cubs as they prepare to live and thrive in an extremely harsh environment, presented as a comic book. Fact and fiction combine in this informative but engaging and entertaining look at climate change and the impact on these animals. Back matter includes a glossary, bibliography, and source notes.

Level 3 Books

Fiction

- Selznick: *The Invention of Hugo Cabret: A Novel in Words and Pictures* c2007 adventure, mystery Caldecott Medal Winner When twelve-year-old Hugo, an orphan living and repairing clocks within the walls of a Paris train station in 1931, meets a mysterious toymaker and his goddaughter, his undercover life and his biggest secret are jeopardized.
- Ryan: *Esperanza Rising* c2000 historical fiction, diversity During the Great Depression, Esperanza and her mother are forced from their wealthy home in Mexico to Southern California where they work in harsh conditions.
- Golding: *The Secret Within* c2002 realistic fiction Carly's domineering father has a painful family secret that causes Carly to face danger and seek freedom at night
- Di Camillo: *The Tale of Despereaux: Being the Story of a Mouse, a Princess, Some Soup and a Spool of Thread* c2003 fantasy Tale of a tiny mouse with huge ears, a princess that he loves, a servant girl who wishes to be a princess and a rat named Roscuro who yearns for soup.
- Carbone: *Stealing Freedom* c1998 historical fiction, diversity This story is based on the true experiences of a young slave girl who escapes to Canada on the Underground Railroad.

Nonfiction

- Levine: *Hana's Suitcase: A True Story* c2002 biography The director of a newly opened Holocaust museum in Japan and her students
- Yousafzai: *I Am Malala: How One Girl Stood Up for Education and Changed the World (Young Readers Edition)* When the Taliban took control of the Swat Valley in Pakistan, one girl spoke out. Malala Yousafzai refused to be silenced and fought for her right to an education. On Tuesday, October 9, 2012, when she was fifteen, she almost paid the ultimate price. She was shot in the head at point-blank range while riding the bus home from school, and few expected her to survive.

- Montgomery: *Something Rotten: A Fresh Look at Roadkill* This engaging narrative is an eye-opening and irreverent look at the dead and dying animals that we pass by without a second thought as well as a fascinating insight to the scientific research process.
- Partridge: *Boots on the Ground: America's War in Vietnam* This book is a comprehensive exploration of the Vietnam War from many different perspectives including an American soldier, a nurse, and a Vietnamese refugee. Some quoted text contains racial slurs and profanity reflective of the era.

- Find a poem in a book or online. Write five sentences about what you are thinking after reading this poem.
- Spend five minutes observing nature. Tell what you see, smell, hear and feel.
- Write a story using these five words: beach ball, ocean, crab, pail, and shark.
- Write about two places you would like to travel. Compare and contrast the similarities and differences of these two places.
- Choose one of these words and write about whatever comes to your mind for five minutes without stopping: beach, 4th of July, hot dogs, baseball, apple pie, school, insects, flowers, video games, art, music.
- Choose a color. Then write about a memory that relates to that color. Try not to use that color name as you write.
- Write about the best holiday you ever had.
