

Elective Choices for Freshman Year 2019-20

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| Introduction to Family and Consumer Sciences 661F | This is a basic course which offers a variety of experiences in personal development and family relationships, clothing construction, food preparation and meal planning, and child care, as they relate to adolescent needs. |
| 653F Intro to Guitar & Popular Music | This course presents students with an overview of the basic concepts in music theory, music history, electronic music, piano lab, and music's place in society and culture in the United States |
| Mixed Choir 621F/ Concert Choir 641F | Students are expected to participate in a number of performances during the school year. This includes rehearsals and performances outside of the school day. |
| 605F Preparatory Band | Some rental instruments are available. When students have progressed to a sufficient point, they are recommended for membership in the Performance Band. |
| 601F Performance Band | Marching Band, Pep Band, Concert Band-Previous band instrument experience is required and students will be expected to participate in a number of performances in and outside of the school day. |
| 581F Introduction to Art | This course is a general survey and introduction to art. Recommended to those wishing to take additional art classes. |
| 582F Art History | This course is designed for all students who appreciate art and the humanities; artistic talent is not required. |
| 557 Arabic for Native Speakers I | This course is for native speakers of Arabic who wish to develop all facets of their Arabic language skills: speaking, listening, writing and reading. <i>Offered at Richards campus only.</i> |
| 558 Arabic or Native Speakers II | This course is for native speakers of Arabic who wish to grow their Modern Standard Arabic language skills. Students in this class have strong verbal abilities and experience in reading and writing. <i>Offered at Richards campus only.</i> |
| 571F German I | In the first year of study, the emphasis is on understanding, speaking, reading and writing the language. <i>Offered at Shepard campus only.</i> |
| 560 Spanish Communications | This course is designed to build real world Spanish conversational skills for all students regardless of prior experience. <i>Offered at Delta/Summit campus only.</i> |
| 561F Spanish I** | In the first year of study, the emphasis is on understanding, speaking, reading and writing the language. |
| 562F Spanish II** | In the second year of language study, there is continued emphasis on understanding, speaking, reading, and writing. |
| 576F Spanish for Native Speakers I *** | This course is for native Spanish speakers who have limited literacy skills in Spanish and wish to improve their reading, writing, listening and speaking of the language. |
| 578F Spanish for Native Speakers II*** | This course is taken to improve written and oral communication in Spanish, to enhance Spanish reading comprehension and analytical skills, to build on students' historical and literacy knowledge of the Hispanic cultures. |
| 551F French I** | In the first year of study, the emphasis is on understanding, speaking, reading and writing the language. |
| 552F French II** | In the second year of language study, there is continued emphasis on understanding, speaking, reading, and writing. |
| 472F World History 473F Honors World History | This course is concerned with the full range of history from prehistoric man to the present time. The Honors course requires advanced writing skills, higher order thinking and supplemental readings. |
| 511S Intro to Business* | Do you want to learn how to balance checking accounts, invest in the stock market, or learn what it takes to buy a car? This class will help you graduate and learn the basic financial skills to live a prosperous life. This course fulfills the Consumer Education graduation requirement. |
| 515S Keyboarding & Document Processing* | Do you want to type faster? Finish essays and projects quicker? In Keyboarding, you will learn to touch type, format various documents that you will use academically and professionally, and learn the basic features in Microsoft Word. |
| 516S Computer Concepts* | Prepare yourself for your future! Whether you decide on college or to enter the business world after graduation, Computer Concepts will teach you the applications needed to succeed. Learn PowerPoint, Word, Excel, Access, and Publisher. Earn college credit and have the opportunity to earn Microsoft certification for PowerPoint. Keyboarding is recommended before this class. |
| *427S Production/Construction | Designed to foster awareness and understanding of production and construction methods. Students will have the opportunity to develop basic skills using hand, bench and power tools. |
| 432S Energy/Power* | This course is designed to foster an awareness and understanding of how we use energy to power our industrial/technological society. |
| 439S Electricity & House Wiring* | This course is designed to provide a variety of fundamental experiences in house wiring, application, repair and basic electricity concepts. |
| 447S Drafting/CAD I: Intro to Engineering Drafting/Design* | Experiences in drafting will include the use of basic tools leading to the use of computers-aided drafting (CAD) systems to produce two and three dimensional drawings. Drafting/CAD is an essential course for any student interested in the fields of architecture, engineering, construction trades or computer graphics. |
| 267F JROTC 1 | The objectives of this course are to develop informed, responsible citizens and leadership skills. JROTC consists of non-combat training and does not obligate a participating student to military service after high school graduation. Must be taken as a full year course. |
| Orchestra I 650/ Orchestra II 652 | Orchestra I is offered to all students, with or without experience playing orchestral instruments. Orchestra II placement is by director approval. <i>Offered at Eisenhower campus only.</i> |
