

Dear Prospective AP Economics Students and Parents,

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome you to AP Economics at Yorktown High School. I hope that you will find this class to be informative and challenging. Economics is perhaps the most practical class you will take in high school because, no matter what course of study you pursue in college, and what career path you might choose in life, economics will affect you. The more understanding we have of the subject, the easier it is for us to respond to economic changes. I am proud to say that we have numerous graduates of AP Economics who have gone on to make the study of economics their college major or minor and are moving into a career path based on that study.

As for my background, I am a graduate of Yorktown High School and Valparaiso University. I graduated from Valparaiso University School of Law and practiced law in Indiana for over ten years. My Transition to Teaching programs have been through Ball State and Taylor Universities. I have been in the teaching profession in various capacities for over fifteen years, and this will be my twelfth year teaching AP Economics. My wife and I have raised 5 children who have all moved on into their adult lives.

Since AP courses at Yorktown are intended to qualify for college credit, this class will be conducted in a fashion very similar to a college classroom. The course work is challenging and more demanding than typical high school classes. Students can expect weekly assignments which are fairly extensive, i.e. 40-60 questions per assignment. The reading requirements for the class are also greater than those of a normal high school class. Therefore, I would like to help ease the reading burden for the first semester by assigning summer reading.

Like most college courses we will also have readings outside of our textbook. I will be adding outside readings throughout the year from additional sources such as *Common Sense Economics* and *The Ascent of Money*. I will provide more info on those sources later.

Our text is *Principles in Economics* by N. Gregory Mankiw (6th edition). You should contact me through the school e-mail account to make arrangements to pick up your three summer study guide assignments and textbook, if you did not pick it up prior to the end of the school year. I will be in the building almost every Monday and Thursday just prior to 10 a.m. and after 12 p.m. I will also be available just before 3:30 p.m. on Wednesdays and on Fridays around 10 a.m. These are routine times I am in the building during the summer, but I also drop in frequently at other times. Let me know what works for you, and I will see what I can do to accommodate that.

The study guides correlate with the first three chapters of the Mankiw text. They will be due on the first day of class.

Our class is not all reading and hard work. One feature of our year of study will be a research project on poverty in the first semester which will culminate with a sock drive to benefit the Muncie Mission. There will be a significant writing requirement related to this project. Each week we will also have in-depth discussions of current economic developments in the world.

I will be in the Yorktown area most of the summer. If you need to speak with me I would suggest that you contact me by e-mail to set up an appointment around the time periods I have identified above.
