Planned Improvements in Student Performance

The School Site Council (SSC) understands the future analysis of the performance of all student groups in the school must be considered through the lens of the state priorities within the Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP). The SSC has considered and analyzed the specific school actions through the four District goals listed. As a result, the SSC has adopted the following school goals, related actions, and expenditures to increase the performance of all student groups in meeting District goals.

1) INCREASE STUDENT ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT TO ENSURE COLLEGE AND CAREER READINESS

Identified School Need: *(What is the goal?)* The goal is to support and improve the participation rate of students enrolled in A-G courses and taking college courses.

Data: *(What data was used to identify the school need and form the goal?)* Participation rate was determined by student completion of high school diploma (28 students in the 15-16 school year and 39 students in the 16-17 school year). In addition, student concurrent enrollment/completion in community college courses increased from 0 students in 2015-16 to 4 students in 2016-2017.

Identified Metrics: *(How will the school evaluate progress?)* Progress will be evaluated by the number of students earning a high school diploma (A-G courses with a “C” or better). Progress will also be evaluated by the number of students concurrently enrolled in college courses for the 17-18 school year.

2) INCREASE STUDENT ENGAGEMENT AND WHOLE CHILD OUTCOMES

Identified School Need: *(What is the goal?)* The goal is to increase student attendance, course completion, graduation rate, and student participation in the following: school-wide activities; ASB/school yearbook; counseling groups; Intramural sports opportunities; student events on campus; So Cal Roc Courses; and community activities. In addition, the goal is to increase positive school climate of the school by encouraging good citizenship and building positive relationships between students and staff.

Data: *(What data was used to identify the school need and form the goal?)* The data from the 2016-2017 school year used to identify the need included: the number of students participating in school activities on campus (71 students); the number of students enrolled in ASB (22 students during the fall semester and 21 in the spring semester); So Cal Roc Courses (12 courses completed); and the number of students participating in community activities (43 students). The data used to identify the school need was RSHS Student and Parent Surveys; WestEd data; and student suspension data (5 students suspended in the 2016-2017 school year).

Identified Metrics: *(How will the school evaluate progress?)* The school will evaluate progress by student participation in the following: school-wide activities; school groups; service learning courses; ASB; school yearbook; and community activities. The school will evaluate progress by the California Healthy Kid's Survey results; Parent Surveys; RSHS Student Survey; data from suspensions.


