BLHS CATE Completers

Students must complete a sequence of 4 required courses in the Career and Technology Cluster (Agriculture Education, Business and Information Technology, Mechatronics, Sports Medicine, Law Enforcement, Bio-Medical, and Building Construction). Upon completion of the various CATE courses Batesburg Leesville High School has to offer, students will be recognized as CATE Completers in their senior year.

Post-Graduation Destinations

Destination: Work or Military

Work: Students should strive to secure a work site towards the end of senior year.

Military: Students should speak with recruiters as early as possible during high school. Recruiters from different military branches come to BLHS during lunch and are available to talk to students. Students interested in the military may also wish to take the ASVAB for military-entrance purposes and job identification.

Destination: Two-Year College

Transfer vs. Career Programs: Students can attend a two-year college to work towards a degree in a certain career. Students may also wish to look into the transfer programs at two-year colleges, which allow students to transfer from a two-year school to a four-year school after completion of a certain number of credits.

Entrance Exam: Students going to a two-year school should take the entrance exam or placement test required by the college. For example, Midlands Technical College requires ASSET or Accuplacer. Some programs at two-year colleges may require the SAT or ACT.

Destination: Four-Year College

Students should check with the four-year colleges that they are interested in for their specific admissions requirements. Students should also take a college entrance exam (ACT or SAT).



PLEASE NOTE: Students should ALWAYS check with their college of interest to verify the correct freshman admissions requirements.

Course Requirements for All 4-Year South Carolina State-Supported Colleges and Universities

Four Units of English: All four units must have strong reading (including works of fiction and non-fiction), writing, communicating, and researching components. It is strongly recommended that students take two units that are literature based, including American, British, and World Literature. Completion of College Preparatory English I, II, III, and IV will meet this criterion.

Four Units of Mathematics: These include Algebra I (for which Foundations and Intermediate Algebra may count together as a substitute, if a student successfully completes Algebra II), Algebra II, and Geometry. A fourth higher-level mathematics course should be selected from among Algebra III/Trigonometry, PreCalculus, Calculus, Statistics, Discrete Mathematics, or a Capstone Mathematics course and should be taken during the senior year.

Three Units of Laboratory Sciences: Two units must be taken in two different fields of the physical, earth, or life sciences and selected from among biology, chemistry, physics, or earth science. The third unit may be from the same field as one of the first two units (biology, chemistry, physics, or earth science) or from any laboratory science for which biology, chemistry, physics and/or earth science is a prerequisite. Courses in general or introductory science for which one of these four units is not a prerequisite will not meet this requirement. It's strongly recommended that students desiring to pursue careers in science, mathematics, engineering or technology take one course in all four fields: biology, chemistry, physics, and earth science.

Two Units of the Same Foreign Language Two units with a heavy emphasis on language acquisition. (Clemson and College of Charleston require THREE)

Three Units of Social Sciences: One unit of U.S. History, a half unit of Economics, and a half unit of Government are required. An additional unit of World History or Geography is strongly recommended.

One Unit of Fine Art: One unit in appreciation of, history of, or performance in one of the fine arts. This unit should be selected from among media/digital arts, dance, music, theater, or visual and spatial arts.

Elective: Two units must be taken as electives. A college preparatory course in Computer Science (i.e., one involving significant programming content, not simply keyboarding or using applications) is strongly recommended for this elective. Other acceptable electives include college preparatory courses in English; fine arts; foreign languages; social science; humanities; mathematics; physical education; and laboratory science (courses for which biology, chemistry, physics, or earth science is a prerequisite).

One Unit of Physical Education or ROTC: One unit of physical education to include one semester of personal fitness and another semester in lifetime fitness. Exemption applies to students enrolled in Junior ROTC and for students exempted because of physical disability or for religious reasons.

College Application Process

- 1) **GET AN APPLICATION:** Most college applications can be accessed online. Students can simply go to the college's website and fill out the online application.
- 2) **APPLY:** Students should read and follow all directions and fill out the application thoroughly. If using a paper application, be sure to write neatly and legibly. If an application requires an essay, make a copy or save it to your computer in case it gets lost or you need a similar essay for another college.
- 3) **COUNSELOR FORM:** Some colleges include a sheet that must be completed by a counselor. Print this form and bring it to the Counseling Office as soon as possible.
- 4) **RECOMMENDATION LETTER:** Colleges often require recommendations. This can be either a letter or may be a certain form the college has within the application. Be sure to give the writer of any recommendation plenty of time to complete the letter or form. It is recommended that you provide the writer a copy of your resume or an activity sheet listing your activities, awards, accomplishments, etc.
- 5) **TRANSCRIPT:** After completing the application, students are required to request their high school transcripts through ScribOrder to be sent to each college that they are applying to. The link for this website is listed on the BLHS Counseling site.
- 6) **ACT/SAT SCORES:** Colleges require that students have the test scores sent directly from the ACT or College Board (SAT) directly. Students can also indicate which colleges they would like for their scores to be sent to when they take the test. BLHS's school code is 410110.
- 7) **COMMON NOTIFICATION:** Many colleges, especially the more selective ones, adhere to common notification dates. This means that they have a cut-off date for receipt of applications. Be mindful of early deadlines vs. regular deadlines. The college evaluates all completed applications received before that date and selects those applicants which it feels to be best qualified for admission.
- 8) **ROLLING ADMISSIONS:** This is the term used by colleges which do not wait for a specific date to notify all their applicants, but rather send their decisions upon receipt and review of all credentials.

Each college's admissions page will tell you whether the college uses rolling admissions or common notification. If a college uses rolling admissions, it is obviously to your advantage to apply early since it becomes harder to get in as more freshmen are admitted.

South Carolina State Scholarships

Palmetto Fellows Scholarship

To qualify, a student must meet one of the two academic requirements:

1. Score 1200 on the SAT (27 on the ACT); 3.5 GPA at the end of junior year and rank in the top 6% of the class at the end of either the sophomore or junior year; or
2. Score at least 1400 on the SAT (32 on the ACT); 4.0 GPA at the end of the senior year.

Students attending a four-year college receive up to \$6,700 for the freshmen year and up to \$7,500 for their sophomore, junior and senior years. For Enhancement eligibility, Palmetto Fellows must declare a major in an approved math or science program. Eligible students may receive up to \$10,000 (combined funds from the Palmetto Fellows Scholarship and the Scholarship Enhancement) per year beginning with their second/sophomore year of college enrollment.

Life Scholarship

To qualify, a student must meet two of the following three criteria for four-year colleges:

1. Graduate from high school with a 3.0 cumulative GPA on the Uniform Grading Scale calculated after the eighth semester.
2. Receive a score of 1100 on the SAT (24 on the ACT).
3. Rank in the top 30% of the class.

To qualify, a student must meet the following criteria for two-year colleges:

1. Graduate from high school with at least a 3.0 cumulative GPA on the Uniform Grading Scale.

There is no application process. The college will notify the student if he/she is eligible for the Life Scholarship. Students attending a four-year college will receive \$4,700 plus a \$300 book allowance. Students attending a two-year college or technical college will receive the cost of tuition plus a \$300 book allowance. For Enhancement eligibility, Life Scholarship recipients must declare a major in an approved math or science program. Eligible students may receive up to \$7,500 (combined funds from the Life Scholarship and Scholarship Enhancement) per year beginning with their second/sophomore year of college enrollment.

Hope Scholarship

Students attending a four-year college but who do not meet the eligibility requirements for the Life Scholarship. Hope is \$2,500 plus a \$300 book allowance.

Lottery Tuition Assistance

Students who do not meet the eligibility requirements for the Life, Hope, or Palmetto Fellows Scholarships may qualify for a portion of the tuition. Students must fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

General Eligibility Criteria Scholarships & Grants

- ◆ Must be a South Carolina resident
- ◆ Must be a U.S. citizen or legal permanent resident
- ◆ Must be enrolled as degree-seeking student at an eligible South Carolina public or independent institution
- ◆ Must not owe a refund or repayment on any State or Federal financial aid and not be in default on a Federal student loan
- ◆ Must have never been convicted of any felonies and have not been convicted of any second or subsequent alcohol/drug-related misdemeanor offenses within the past academic year (excluding Lottery Tuition Assistance).

Other Scholarship Opportunities

Throughout the year, the BLHS Counseling Department receives information on various scholarships. Listed below are the steps for how to apply for scholarships.

- 1) GET AN APPLICATION: Students can apply for some scholarships using online applications. Other scholarships have paper applications, which students can pick up from the Counseling Department. Students should carefully read the eligibility requirements for these scholarships to see if they qualify.
- 2) COMPLETE THE APPLICATION: Be sure to fill the application out completely. Don't wait until the last minute!
- 3) TURN IN THE APPLICATION: For applications that are turned into Guidance, there will be a deadline date listed for when it is due to your counselor. Students must turn applications in by the date listed for the student to be considered for the scholarship. Students should also be aware of deadlines for online applications.
- 4) TRANSCRIPTS/TEST SCORES: Many scholarships require a transcript and/or scores from the ACT/SAT to be attached. If students turn the scholarship into the Counseling Office, we will attach the transcript and/or scores for them. If students fill an application out online or send it themselves, they will need to request a copy of their transcript and/or test scores from the Counseling Department as outlined in the application. This must be done before the deadline. The first two transcripts are free.
- 5) RECOGNITION: At the end of senior year, there are times where students will be recognized for receiving scholarships. Students must let the Counseling Department know what scholarships they have received in order to be recognized at those times. Towards the end of their senior year, students will receive a Senior Follow-Up Form, which is where they need to list any and all scholarships for recognition.

NCAA Eligibility Information



If a student is planning to participate in a sport at the college level for a Division I or Division II school, he or she MUST register with the NCAA Eligibility Center online at: <https://web3.ncaa.org/ecwr3/>.

**Division III level schools do not require NCAA registration.*

Below is a list of what you will need to register.

- Valid Email Address
- Basic Personal Information
- Educational History
- Sports Participation History
- Payment

Students will also need to submit a request through ScribOrder via the counseling website in order for their transcript to be sent to the NCAA Eligibility Center.

When taking the SAT or ACT, students should use the NCAA Eligibility Center's code of 9999 to have scores sent directly to the Eligibility Center.

For information on academic eligibility requirements, students should refer to the NCAA Guide for the College-Bound Student-Athlete. Copies can be found in the Counseling Office or online at <http://www.ncaapublications.com/productdownloads/CBSA19.pdf>.

Financial Aid Information

The FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) will be available in January. Seniors will need to complete the application online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. Below is a list of what you will need in order to fill out the FAFSA.

- Your Social Security Number
- Your Alien Registration Number (if you are not a U.S. citizen)
- Your most recent federal income tax returns, W-2s, and other records of money earned. (**Note:** You may be able to transfer your federal tax return information into your FAFSA using the IRS Data Retrieval Tool.)
- Bank statements and records of investments (if applicable)
- Records of untaxed income (if applicable)
- A Federal Student Aid PIN to sign electronically. (If you do not already have one, visit www.pin.ed.gov to obtain one.)

If you are a dependent student, then you will also need most of the above information for your parent(s).

Junior Year College Planning

Fall/Winter

- Make lists of your abilities, preferences, and personal qualities. List things you may want to study and do in college and characteristics you want in a college.
- Learn about colleges. Look at their Web sites (www.collegeboard.com) has links. Talk to friends, family, teachers and recent grads of your school now in college.
- Be sure to make the most of the opportunities at BLHS throughout the year. Ed-Op will be on October 25th. We will also offer the PSAT at BLHS on October 11th. Listen to the announcements for more information on how to sign-up.
- Keep your grades up!

Spring

- Sign up to take the SAT and/or ACT in the spring.
- If you're in the Advanced Placement classes, you will take the AP exams given in May. Remember, if you score a 3, 4, or 5 on the test, you will earn 3 hours of college credit at most colleges.
- Make the most of the two college visits you are allowed during your junior year. During the spring semester, these visits are excused absences if you bring a note from the college back and turn it into the Attendance Secretary.
- Create a résumé—a record of your accomplishments, activities and work experiences since you started high school.
- Continue to make good grades!

Summer

- If you are an athlete planning to continue playing a sport in college, register with the NCAA Eligibility Center.
- Find a full-time or part-time job, or participate in a camp or summer college program.
- Visit colleges. Take campus tours and, at colleges you're serious about, make appointments to have interviews with admissions counselors.
- Download applications (or request paper copies) from colleges to which you'll apply.
- Check application dates — large universities may have early dates or rolling admissions.
- Update your resume with any summer activities that you participated in.

Senior Year College Planning

ALL YEAR

- Keep your grades up! Colleges look at your senior year grades and receive a copy of your final transcript at the end of your senior year. Scholarships are often times based on grades and GPA as well.
- Check with the office for scholarships that are available.

August/September

- -Narrow your list of colleges. If you've not yet done so, download college applications and begin filling them out along with any financial aid forms. If you need to, meet with a counselor about your college choices.
- -Make the most of the **two** college visits you are allowed during your senior year. These visits are excused absences if you bring an excuse from the college back and turn it into the Attendance Secretary.
- -If you have not taken or plan to retake the SAT and/or ACT, be sure to sign up for the date that you would like to take it. Also make sure that you indicate which colleges you would like your scores sent to when you take the test.
- -Representatives from various colleges will come to BLHS throughout the fall. Be sure to talk to the representatives that visit from colleges that you're interested in.
- -Create a master list or calendar that includes:
 - Tests you'll take and their fees, dates and registration deadlines
 - College application due dates
 - Required financial aid application forms and their deadlines (aid applications may be due before college applications)
 - Other materials you'll need (recommendations, transcripts, etc.)

October

- Try to finalize your college choices.
- Prepare early decision/early action or rolling admission applications as soon as possible.
- Ask a teacher for recommendations if you need them and give them plenty of time to complete the recommendation. Be sure to turn your Senior Information Sheet into Guidance with all of the information that will be helpful for teachers to have when writing your recommendations.
- For each recommendation, provide a stamped, addressed envelope and any college forms required.
- If you're submitting essays, write first drafts and ask teachers and others to read them. If you're applying for early decision, finish the essays for that application now.
- Make the most of Ed-Op on October 25th. Talk to any colleges that you are interested in and be prepared to ask them any questions that you may have.
- College Application Day will be on October 18th. This is a day where you will be given time to apply to colleges online during the school day. Make the most of this opportunity.
- The FAFSA will be available in October. Be sure to complete the online application at www.fafsa.ed.gov.
- Be sure to continue updating your resume throughout your senior year.

November

- Be aware of early decision and common notification application deadlines.
- Fill out a transcript request form in Counseling Office for every college application you send in.

December

- For common notification, most applications are due by December 1st or early December. Be aware of deadlines and turn your applications in on time!
- As you finish and send your applications and essays, be sure to keep photocopies.
- If the college wants to see second-semester grades, be sure to let the counselor know and give any specific form to your counselor.

January

- If you apply online to colleges, be sure to have your high school send a transcript.

February

- No senioritis, please! Accepting colleges **do** look at second-semester senior grades.
- Watch for your Student Aid Report (SAR). It should arrive after the FAFSA is filed. The SAR confirms the information you sent on the FAFSA and tells you how much your family will need to contribute to your education--the Expected Family Contribution (EFC).

March

- Keep active in school. If you are waitlisted, the college will want to know what you have accomplished between the time you applied and the time you learned of its decision.


April

- You should receive acceptance letters and financial aid offers by mid-April. If you've not done so yet, visit your final college before accepting. As soon as you decide, notify your counselor of your choice.

May

- May 1: Colleges cannot require your deposit or your commitment to attend before May 1. By that postmarked date, you must inform every college of your acceptance or rejection of the offer of admission and/or financial aid.
- If you're in the Advanced Placement Program at BLHS, you will take the AP exams given in May. Remember, if you score a 3, 4, or 5 on the test, you will earn 3 hours of college credit at most colleges.
- Send your deposit to one college only.
- Waitlisted by a college? If you intend to enroll if you are accepted, tell the admission director your intent and ask how to strengthen your application. Need financial aid?
- Ask whether funds will be available if you're accepted.
- Fill out and return the Senior Follow-Up sheet that your counselor will give you. We must have this in order to send your final transcript to your college of choice. This form is also where you list the scholarships that you have received, and BLHS uses that list to recognize you for the scholarships you have received.
