Course Description:

I. Course goals

- a. This one-year course is designed to focus on four critical areas: 1) connecting ratio and rate to whole number multiplication and division and using concepts of ratio and rate to solve problems; 2) completing understanding of division of fractions and extending the notion of number to the system of rational numbers, which includes negative numbers; 3) writing, interpreting, and using expressions and equations; and 4) developing understanding of statistical thinking. Instructional practices incorporate integration of diversity awareness including appreciation of all cultures and their important contributions to society. The use of manipulatives, mathematical tools, and technology, including calculators and computer software, is an integral part of this course. This course fulfills the mathematics requirement for sixth-grade, seventh-grade, and eighth-grade students.

II. Course content and time schedule (sequential)

- a. Number Concepts: Number Theory and Fraction/Decimal Concepts
- b. Integers: Introduction to Integers and The Coordinate Plane
- c. Expressions & Equations: Properties of Operations, Writing and Solving Equations and Solving and Graphing Inequalities.
- d. Ratio & Proportions: Ratio and Unit Rates, Proportional Reasoning and Percents.
- e. Geometry: Angles and Triangles, Area and Perimeter of Polygons, Polygons on a Coordinate Plane, Nets and Surface Area, Volume.
- f. Data Analysis: Summarizing Data Graphically, Measures of Center, Measures of Variability.

IV. Evaluation

a. Criteria for arriving at students grades -

- i. Summative Assessment: Tests, quizzes, and assignments given to assess student understanding after practice are the most accurate means of evaluating mastery of a standard(s). **60% of your child's overall grade will be based on these types of summative assessments.** If your child receives a C or below, he or she may attend math lab to retake the assessment.

- ii. Formative Assessment: Homework, prime-times, notes, class assignments and individual/group participation are designed to provide practice and help your child develop an understanding of a standard(s). **40% of your child's overall grade will be based on these types of formative assessments.** Although these are a smaller percentage of the overall grade, they provide the practice and feedback needed to reach mastery.

- i. Semester exams will not be administered early. Students who are absent may make-up their exams on the district approved make-up day.

d. How and when students will be advised of their grades

- i. Parents and students are urged to check the Infinite Campus Portal for grades regularly.
- ii. Updated student grades will be given in the classroom each week. Students will be encouraged to check their missing assignments or redo assignments and quizzes they have scored low on.
- iii. Unsatisfactory Notices – mailed six weeks after the start of a new quarter.
- iv. Report Cards every quarter.

e. Citizenship/behavior expectations

Students will respect the rights of others and accept responsibility for their own behavior and learning. Below is the scale for citizenship. All reports of misconduct will be documented in my grade book so both the students and parents are aware of citizenship progress via parent link.

- Actively participates in class discussions

3-5 Satisfactory Behavior

- Frequently demonstrates self-control
- Follows directions; comes to class with proper supplies; good listener; frequently asks for help when needed;
- Hardly ever disrupts the class

- Demonstrates a willingness to help other students
- Frequently participates in class discussions

6-8 Needs Improvement

- Usually pays attention in class, often distracts or is distracting to other students
- Seldom follows directions the first time given; often distracts or is distracting to other students; listens inconsistently
- Stops distracting others only when reminded repeatedly
- Rarely participates in class discussions

9 + Unsatisfactory Behavior

- Rarely pays attention in class; often distracted or is distracting others
- Does not follow directions; seldom prepared with materials or work; does not listen to adult directions or advice
- Must be personally reminded to focus on classroom activities; seldom asks for help relevant to classroom tasks
- Rarely appears engaged in learning

- f. Late Work policy – **If a student does not complete any assignment (for reasons other than an absence), they will be assigned a make-up work detention the following school day from 3:30 to 4:25 EVEN if they turn the assignment in the next school day.**
- g. Test retake policy – **A student may only retake a test if 1) all assignments have been turned in 2) the student has asked for help, clarification, or exhibited evidence of further studying and a further mastery of the subject matter.**
