STUDENT WELLNESS</p> <p>St. Marys Area School District recognizes that student wellness and proper nutrition are related to students’ physical well-being, growth, development, and readiness to learn. The Board is committed to providing a school environment that promotes student wellness, proper nutrition, nutrition education, and regular physical activity as part of the total learning experience. In a healthy school environment, students will learn about and participate in positive dietary and lifestyle practices that can improve student achievement.</p> <p>The Board adopts the Student Wellness Policy based on the recommendations of the Wellness Committee and in accordance with federal and state laws.</p> <p>To ensure the health and well-being of all students, the Board establishes that the district shall provide to students:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. A comprehensive nutrition program consistent with federal and state requirements. 2. Access at reasonable cost to foods and beverages that meet established nutritional guidelines. 3. Physical education courses and opportunities for developmentally appropriate physical activity during the school day. 4. Curriculum and programs for grades K-12 that are designed to educate students about proper nutrition and lifelong physical activity, in accordance with State Board of Education curriculum regulations and academic standards. <p>The Superintendent or designee shall be responsible to monitor district schools, programs, and curriculum to ensure compliance with this policy, related policies and established guidelines or administrative regulations.</p> <p>Each building principal or designee shall report to the Superintendent or designee regarding compliance in his/her school.</p> <p>Staff members responsible for programs related to school wellness shall report to the Superintendent or designee regarding the status of such programs.</p> <p>The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board on the district’s compliance with law and policies related to student wellness. The report may include:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Assessment of school environment regarding student wellness issues. 2. Evaluation of food services program.
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<p>42 U.S.C. Sec. 1758b 7 CFR Sec. 210.31</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 3. Review of all foods and beverages sold in schools for compliance with established nutrition guidelines. 4. Listing of activities and programs conducted to promote nutrition and physical activity. 5. Recommendations for policy and/or program revisions. 6. Suggestions for improvement in specific areas. 7. Feedback received from district staff, students, parents/guardians, community members and Wellness Committee. <p>The Superintendent or designee and the established Wellness Committee shall conduct an assessment at least once every three (3) years on the contents and implementation of this policy as part of a continuous improvement process to strengthen the policy and ensure implementation. This triennial assessment shall be made available to the public in an accessible and easily understood manner and include:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The extent to which each district school is in compliance with law and policies related to school wellness. 2. The extent to which this policy compares to model wellness policies. 3. A description of progress made by district in attaining the goals of this policy.
<p>7 CFR Sec. 210.31</p>	<p>At least once every three (3) years, the district shall update or modify this policy as needed, based on the results of the most recent triennial assessment and/or as district and community needs and priorities change; wellness goals are met; new health science, information and technologies emerge; and new federal or state guidance or standards are issued.</p>
<p>42 U.S.C. Sec. 1758b 7 CFR Sec. 210.31</p>	<p>The district shall annually inform and update the public, including parents/guardians, students and others in the community, about the contents, updates and implementation of this policy via the district website, student handbooks, newsletters, posted notices and/or other efficient communication methods. This annual notification shall include information on how to access the School Wellness policy; information about the most recent triennial assessment; information on how to participate in the development, implementation and periodic review and update of the School Wellness policy; and a means of contacting Wellness Committee leadership.</p>
<p>4. Guidelines 7 CFR Sec. 210.15, 210.31</p>	<p><u>Recordkeeping</u></p> <p>The district shall retain records documenting compliance with the requirements of the School Wellness policy, which shall include:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. The written School Wellness policy. 2. Documentation demonstrating that the district has informed the public, on an annual basis, about the contents of the School Wellness policy and any updates to the policy. 3. Documentation of efforts to review and update the School Wellness policy, including who is involved in the review and methods used by the district to inform the public of their ability to participate in the review.

<p>42 U.S.C. Sec. 1758b</p>	<p>4. Documentation demonstrating the most recent assessment on the implementation of the School Wellness policy and notification of the assessment results to the public.</p> <p><u>Wellness Committee</u></p> <p>The Board shall appoint a Wellness Committee comprised of, but not limited to, at least one (1) of each of the following: School Board member, district administrator, district food service representative, student, parent/guardian, member of the public, physical education teacher, school nurse, school counselor, coach, classified staff, school health professional, and other individuals chosen by the Board. It shall be the goal that committee membership will include representatives from each school building and reflect the diversity of the community.</p> <p>The Wellness Committee shall serve as an advisory committee regarding student health issues and shall be responsible for developing, implementing and periodically reviewing and updating a Student Wellness Policy that complies with law to recommend to the Board for adoption.</p>
<p>7 CFR Sec. 210.31</p>	<p>The Wellness Committee shall review and consider evidence-based strategies and techniques in establishing goals for nutrition education and promotion, physical activity and other school based activities that promote student wellness as part of the policy development and revision process.</p> <p>The Wellness Committee may examine related research, assess student needs and the current school environment, review existing Board policies and administrative regulations, and raise awareness about student health issues.</p> <p>The Wellness Committee may make policy recommendations to the Board related to other health issues necessary to promote student wellness.</p>
<p>SC 1513 Pol. 102, 105</p>	<p>The Wellness Committee with permission of the Superintendent or designee may survey parents/guardians and/or students; conduct community forums or focus groups; collaborate with appropriate community agencies and organizations; and engage in similar activities, within the budget established for these purposes.</p> <p>The Wellness Committee shall provide periodic reports to the Superintendent or designee regarding the status of its work, as required.</p> <p><u>Nutrition Education</u></p> <p>The goal of nutrition education is to teach, encourage and support healthy eating by students. Promoting student health and nutrition enhances readiness for learning and increases student achievement.</p> <p>Nutrition education will be provided within the sequential, comprehensive health education program in accordance with curriculum regulations and the academic standards for Health, Safety and Physical Education, and Family and Consumer Sciences.</p>

Pol 808

Nutrition education shall provide all students with the knowledge and skills needed to lead healthy lives.

Nutrition education lessons and activities shall be age-appropriate.

Nutrition curriculum shall be behavior focused.

School food service and nutrition education classes shall cooperate to create a learning laboratory.

Nutrition education may be integrated into other subjects to complement but not replace academic standards based on nutrition education.

Lifelong lifestyle balance shall be reinforced by linking nutrition education and physical activity.

The staff responsible for providing nutrition education shall be properly trained and prepared and shall participate in appropriate professional development. Criteria shall be developed to measure “properly” and “appropriate.”

District staff shall cooperate with agencies and community organizations to provide opportunities for appropriate student projects related to nutrition.

Consistent nutrition messages shall be disseminated throughout the district, schools, classrooms, cafeterias, homes, community and media.

Nutrition education shall extend beyond the school environment by engaging and involving families and communities.

Nutrition Promotion

Nutrition promotion and education positively influence lifelong eating behaviors by using evidence-based techniques and nutrition messages, and by creating food environments that encourage healthy nutrition choices and encourage participation in school meal programs.

Physical Activity

District schools may contribute to the effort to provide students opportunities to accumulate age-appropriate physical activity daily, as recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Opportunities offered at school will augment physical activity outside the school environment, such as outdoor play at home, sports, etc.

District schools shall strive to provide opportunities for developmentally appropriate physical activity during the school day for all students.

Students shall participate daily in a variety of age-appropriate physical activities designed to achieve optimal health, wellness, fitness, and performance benefits.

<p>Pol. 707</p> <p>SC 1512.1 Pol. 102, 105</p>	<p>Age-appropriate physical activity opportunities, such as recess; before and after school; during lunch; clubs; intramurals; and interscholastic athletics, shall be provided to meet the needs and interests of all students, in addition to planned physical education.</p> <p>A physical and social environment that encourages safe and enjoyable activity for all students shall be maintained.</p> <p>Physical activity breaks shall be provided for elementary students during the school day.</p> <p>After-school programs shall provide developmentally appropriate physical activity for participating children.</p> <p>District schools will continue to partner with parents/guardians and community members to institute programs that support physical activity.</p> <p>Students and the community shall have access to physical activity facilities outside school hours according to Board policy.</p> <p>Physical activities shall not be used as a form of punishment.</p> <p><u>Physical Education</u></p> <p>A sequential physical education program consistent with curriculum regulations and Health, Safety and Physical Education academic standards shall be developed and implemented. All district students must participate in physical education.</p> <p>Quality physical education instruction that promotes lifelong physical activity and provides instruction in the skills and knowledge necessary for lifelong participation shall be provided.</p> <p>Physical education classes shall be the means through which all students learn, practice and are assessed on developmentally appropriate skills and knowledge necessary for lifelong, health-enhancing physical activity.</p> <p>A comprehensive physical education course of study that focuses on providing students the skills, knowledge and confidence to participate in lifelong, health-enhancing physical activity shall be implemented.</p> <p>A varied and comprehensive curriculum that leads to students becoming and remaining physically active for a lifetime shall be provided in the physical education program.</p> <p>Adequate amounts of planned instruction shall be provided in order for students to achieve the proficient level for the Health, Safety and Physical Education academic standards.</p>
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<p>SC 1512.1 Pol. 102, 105</p>	<p>A sequential physical education program consistent with curriculum regulations and Health, Safety and Physical Education academic standards shall be developed and implemented. All district students must participate in physical education.</p> <p>A local assessment system shall be implemented to track student progress on the Health, Safety and Physical Education academic standards.</p> <p>Students shall be moderately to vigorously active as much time as possible during a physical education class. Documented medical conditions and disabilities shall be accommodated during class.</p> <p>Safe and adequate equipment, facilities and resources shall be provided for physical education courses.</p> <p>Physical education shall be taught by eligible certified teachers as provided in the Certification, Staffing and Personnel Guidelines posted by the Pennsylvania Department of Education.</p> <p>Appropriate professional development shall be provided for physical education staff.</p> <p><u>Other School Based Activities</u></p>
<p>42 U.S.C. Sec., 1751 et seq, 1773 7CFR 210.30 Pol. 808</p>	<p>Nutrition professionals who meet hiring criteria established by the district and in compliance with federal regulations shall administer the school meals program. Professional development and continuing education shall be provided for district nutrition staff, as required by federal regulations</p> <p>District schools shall provide adequate space, as defined by the district, for eating and serving school meals.</p> <p>Students shall be provided a clean and safe meal environment.</p>
<p>7CFR Sec. 210.10</p>	<p>Meal periods shall be scheduled at appropriate hours, as required by federal regulations and as defined by the district.</p> <p>Drinking water shall be available and accessible to students, without restriction and at no cost to the student, at all meal periods and throughout the school day.</p> <p>Students shall have access to hand washing or sanitizing before meals and snacks.</p> <p>Access to the food service operation shall be limited to authorized staff.</p> <p>Nutrition content of school meals shall be available to students and parents/guardians upon request.</p> <p>To the extent possible, the district shall utilize available funding and outside programs to enhance student wellness.</p>

Sec. 1751 et seq., 1773 7CFR Sec. 210.10, 220.8</p>	<p>Healthy fundraising projects shall be encouraged.</p> <p>Students and parents/guardians may be involved in menu selections through various means, such as taste testing and surveys.</p> <p>The district shall support the efforts of parents/guardians to provide a healthy diet and daily physical activity for children by communicating relevant information through various methods.</p> <p><u>Nutrition Guidelines</u></p> <p>All foods and beverages available in district schools during the school day shall be offered to students with consideration for promoting student health and reducing childhood obesity.</p> <p>All foods and beverages provided through the National School Lunch or School Breakfast Programs shall comply with federal nutrition standards.</p> <p>Foods and beverages offered or sold at school-sponsored events outside the school day, such as athletic events and dances, may offer healthy alternatives in addition to more traditional fare.</p>
<p>SC 504.1</p>	<p><u>Competitive Foods/Beverages</u></p> <p>Competitive foods and beverages are defined as any food or beverage offered or sold at school in competition with reimbursable meals served through the National School Lunch or School Breakfast programs.</p>
<p>SC 504.1</p>	<p>Exclusive competitive food and/or beverage contracts shall be approved by the Board, in accordance with provisions of law.</p>
<p>7 CFR Sec. 210.11, 220.12a, 210.31</p>	<p><i>Competitive Foods –</i></p> <p>Competitive foods available for sale shall meet or exceed the established federal nutrition standards (USDA Smart Snacks in School). These standards shall apply in all locations and through all services where foods and beverages are sold to students, which may include, but are not limited to: a la carte options in cafeterias, vending machines, school stores, snack carts and fundraisers.</p>
<p>7 CFR Sec. 210.11, 210.31</p>	<p>Competitive foods are defined as foods and beverages offered or sold to students on school campus during the school day, which are not part of the reimbursable school breakfast or lunch.</p> <p>For purposes of this policy, school campus means any area of property under the jurisdiction of the school that students may access during the school day.</p>
<p>7 CFR Sec. 210.11, 210.31</p>	<p>For purposes of this policy, school day means the period from midnight before school begins until thirty (30) minutes after the end of the official school day.</p>

<p>7 CFR Sec. 210.11</p>	<p>The district may impose additional restrictions on competitive foods, provided that the restrictions are not inconsistent with federal requirements.</p>
<p>Pol. 229</p>	<p><i>Fundraiser Exemptions –</i></p> <p>Fundraising activities held during the school day involving the sale of competitive foods shall be limited to foods that meet the Smart Snacks in School nutrition standards, unless an exemption is approved in accordance with applicable Board policy and administrative regulations.</p>
<p>7 CFR Sec. 210.11</p>	<p>The district may allow a limited number of exempt fundraisers as permitted by the Pennsylvania Department of Education each school year: up to five (5) exempt fundraisers in elementary and middle school buildings, and up to ten (10) exempt fundraisers in high school buildings. Exempt fundraisers are fundraisers in which competitive foods are available for sale to students that do not meet the Smart Snacks in School nutrition standards.</p> <p>The district shall establish administrative regulations to implement fundraising activities in district schools, including procedures for requesting a fundraiser exemption.</p> <p><i>Non-Sold Competitive Foods –</i></p> <p>Non-sold competitive foods available to students, which may include but are not limited to foods and beverages offered as rewards and incentives, at classroom parties and celebrations, or as shared classroom snacks, shall meet or exceed the standards established by the district.</p> <p>If the offered competitive foods do not meet or exceed the Smart Snacks in School nutrition standards, the following standards shall apply:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Rewards and Incentives: Foods and beverages shall not be used as a reward for classroom or school activities unless the reward is an activity that promotes a positive nutrition message (e.g., guest chef, field trip to a farm or farmers market, etc.). 2. Classroom Parties and Celebrations: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Parents/Guardians shall be informed through newsletters or other efficient communication methods that foods/beverages should only be brought in when requested for scheduled parties. b. When possible, foods/beverages for parties and celebrations shall be provided by the food service department to help prevent food safety and allergy concerns. <p>The district shall provide a list of suggested nonfood ideas and healthy food and beverage alternatives to parents/guardians and staff, which may be posted via the district website, student handbook, newsletters, posted notices and/or other efficient communication methods.</p>

<p>7 CFR Sec. 210.11, 210.31</p>	<p><i>Marketing/Contracting –</i></p> <p>Any foods and beverages marketed or promoted to students on the school campus during the school day shall meet or exceed the established federal nutrition standards (USDA Smart Snacks in School) and comply with established Board policy and administrative regulations.</p>
<p>SC 504.1</p>	<p>Exclusive competitive food and/or beverage contracts shall be approved by the Board, in accordance with provisions of law. Existing contracts shall be reviewed and modified to the extent feasible to ensure compliance with established federal nutrition standards, including applicable marketing restrictions.</p>
<p>Pol. 209.1</p>	<p><u>Management of Food Allergies in District Schools</u></p> <p>The district shall establish Board policy and administrative regulations to address food allergy management in district schools in order to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Reduce and/or eliminate the likelihood of severe or potentially life-threatening allergic reactions. 2. Ensure a rapid and effective response in case of a severe or potentially life-threatening allergic reaction. 3. Protect the rights of students by providing them, through necessary accommodations when required, the opportunity to participate fully in all school programs and activities. <p><u>Safe Routes To School</u></p> <p>The district shall cooperate with local municipalities, public safety agency, police departments, and community organizations to develop and maintain safe routes to school.</p> <p>District administrators shall seek and utilize available federal and state funding for safe routes to school, when appropriate.</p>
