

**Moanalua High School
School Community Council
Meeting
November 30, 2017**

I. **Call to Order:** The meeting was called to order at 5:31 p.m. by SCC Chair Byron Nagasako in the office conference room.

II. **Minutes of the October 26, 2017 meeting:** The minutes were approved as distributed.

III. **Principal's Report:**

- A. At the Community meeting this evening, Mrs. Martin will share the 2017-2020 three-year Academic Plan, formerly a yearly plan. The purpose of the meeting is to gather feedback and input for possible revision. The full plan is available on the school website (moanaluahs.org). The community can submit recommendations via email.
- B. There is one addition to the plan from the version the SCC saw earlier in the year. The school's Professional Development team acts as the Academic Review Team, and the group found an area it suggested for amendment. Mrs. Martin clarified that items may be added or deleted as necessary as circumstances change.
- C. The new school vision and mission are now on the website, updated Nov. 30.
- D. The school has had three "rough" weeks, and there may be parents at this meeting sharing their concerns. The purpose of the Community Meeting is supposed to be about sharing the Academic Plan, not recent events, but she is ready for any questions. Mrs. Martin thanked the SCC for its support of the administration during this and at all times.
- E. Regarding the recent events that were on the local TV news stations, Mrs. Martin said some of the information parents might want at this meeting tonight is confidential because it involves minors, so she will be careful when addressing the parents. She explained that there is a DOE protocol in terms of permissible communications with the public, and this process can take time. In the recent event, Mrs. Martin shared that some parts of the media reports were inaccurate. Anyone can have their identity stolen on social media, she reminded the group, so the school must not be quick to assume or accuse. Safety is a priority, and any issues are taken seriously and addressed with the appropriate organizations. If there had been a credible threat, the school would have taken appropriate actions. The school website has a text alert number parents can register for. Tamsin said on the North Shore, the military installation there provides noise warnings to the community so people are aware.
- F. The DOE awarded the school money to cover buses for the marching band and football team because they were not able to access the field during construction

- delays that were not the school's fault. They also released money for track equipment, which had been cancelled earlier after the construction delays used up those funds.
- G. The design is almost complete for the performing arts auditorium. This will affect the school's Academic Plan in the long run. The track and field should be completed by December 23. Graduation will be on the athletic field this year.
 - H. The Korean Consulate awarded the Moanalua Complex \$32,000 to support a language program involving select elementary, the middle and the high school. The first lady was here.
