What is a School-Parent Compact?

A *School-Parent Compact for Achievement* is an agreement that parents, students and teachers develop together. It explains how parents and teachers will work together to make sure all our students reach or exceed grade-level standards.

Effective compacts:

- Link to goals of the school improvement plan.
- Focus on student learning skills.
- Describe how teachers will help students develop skills using high-quality curriculum and effective instruction in a supportive learning environment.
- Share strategies to parents to use at home.
- Explain how teachers and parents will communicate about student progress.
- Describe opportunities for parents to volunteer, observe, and participate in the classroom.

Jointly Developed

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The School-Parent Compact was developed by a collaborative effort of parents, students, teachers, community representatives, and administrators. The English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC) provided recommendations and worked in conjunction with School Site Council to develop and adopt the compact. This policy will be shared and distributed to the parents and stakeholders in an understandable language. It will be updated annually based on needs assessment and it will then be approved by the School Site Council.



Activities to Build Partnerships

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The Parent Center will provide access and interpretation/translation for parents who need support. The school's Community Rep. and coordinators will work with parents and organize activities to foster the partnership between KHS and parents by actively working to:

1. Provide workshops on how to support student learning.
2. Provide orientation day(s) and Back-to-School night to help parents and students to understand the school's rules and expectations.
3. Collaborate with the Parent Teacher Student Association (PTSA) to support parents and students.
4. Encourage parents to be involved in decision making councils (i.e. ELAC, SBM, and SSC).
5. Host "Coffee with the Administrators."
6. Host award nights to recognize student academic achievements and parent participation.
7. Help parents activate Schoology.
8. Provide parenting, computer, and literacy classes to parents.
9. Provide volunteer opportunities for parents.
10. Recognize parent participation and achievement.

District Goals 1A

Milestones for Graduation, College and Career Success

LAUSD students are the leaders, educators, entrepreneurs, artists, and innovators of tomorrow. LAUSD is committed to providing high-quality instruction and supports to achieve our goal of 100% graduation.

LAUSD has identified ten milestones used as benchmarks to guide our efforts in ensuring all students graduate and experience future college and career success. The following four milestones pertain to high schools:

1. Algebra 1 completion by end of grade 9—a key indicator for high school graduation.
2. 3.0 GPA or above—a key indicator for college readiness.
3. SAT or ACT completion—gives students the option of attending a four-year university.
4. Student aspirations—student who self-report on the School Experience Survey that they plan to attend a technical, two-year, or four-year college.

In the Classroom 1B

The staff and teachers at Kennedy HS believe school is important for every student. We want every student to succeed and to learn. In order to provide the best learning environment and opportunities for each student we commit to the following responsibilities:

2. Provide a variety of instructional strategies and assessments to address Common Core State Standards.
3. Assign homework that supports high quality instruction.
4. Provide a variety of communiqués to parents/guardians, including Connect Ed, Schoology, district mark reports, and conference nights.
5. Respond promptly to parent calls and concerns.
6. Suggest and provide study skills to help students be lifelong learners.
7. Use standards-based instruction and check for understanding.
8. Provide clear expectations for all classroom activities.
9. Refer at-risk students to academic intervention program(s) after the ten-week grading period.
10. **Use Schoology to monitor students' progress and communicate with parents if the grade is a D or lower.**
11. Make learning relevant to students' lives.
12. Teachers will follow the District's grading policy.

At Home 2

As a parent/guardian of a Kennedy High School student, I understand and believe that my participation in my child's education is important for success and progress. For this reason, I am committed to the following responsibilities:

1. Provide a quiet, well-lit place for my child to study while communicating on a regular basis with my child.
2. Reach out to teachers and/or school staff after the five week grading period to help my child's learning.
3. Consistently supervise my child's academic progress and review, sign, and return the Ten Week and Fifteen Week Progress reports.
4. Attend Back-to-School Night, Open House, parent-teacher conferences, and at least three other school events.
5. Help my child be on time and attend school regularly.
6. Help my child meet his/her school responsibilities by limiting the amount of television watching and video/computer game playing.
7. Activate my Schoology account, observe classrooms, and volunteer in some capacity if possible.
8. **Monitor my child's academic progress using Schoology and contact the teacher when my child's grade is a D or lower.**
9. Take my child to visit colleges/universities and/or career fairs when possible.
