Course Title: AP English Literature & Composition

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

The AP English Literature and Composition course aligns to an introductory college-level literary analysis course. The course engages students in the *careful* reading and *critical analysis* of imaginative literature. Through the close examination of selected texts, students will deepen their understanding of the ways writers use *language* to provide both meaning and pleasure for their readers. As they read, students will consider a work's structure, style and themes, as well as such smaller-scale elements as the use of *figurative language*, *imagery*, *symbolism*, and *tone*. Writing assignments include expository, analytical, and argumentative essays that require students to analyze and interpret literary works. Students prepare for the AP English Literature and Composition Exam and may be granted advanced placement, college credit, or both as a result of satisfactory performance.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

According to the AP College Board, upon completing the AP English Literature and Composition course students should be able to: improve close reading and analytical strategies, stretch imaginative abilities in reaction to literature, improve your ability to find and explain (through discussion and writing) what is of value in literature, develop an effective understanding and use of rhetoric strategies, including imagery, figurative language, tone, voice, diction, and sentence structure, improve organization in writing to improve coherence and emphasis, effectively explain and support arguments, advance vocabulary skills and language appropriation

READING ASSIGNMENTS

The most essential requirement for this course is that students read every assignment –read it with care, reread it, and read it on time. Poetry will need to be read multiple times and analyzed effectively. Please do not think that poetry assignments will be easier because they are shorter in length. Novels will demand planning and extensive time devoted to reading analysis.

WRITING ASSIGNMENTS

After learning how to closely analyze a text, students will write a response of various lengths in order to demonstrate the extent of their analysis. Students will write at least 2 -3 essays per quarter about a variety of prose and poetry topics. Students will analyze past AP English Literature and Composition free-response prompts and anchor papers to help develop their understanding of what makes writing effective. Throughout the year, students will learn to develop analytical theses and develop arguments. Students will go through and become familiar with the writing process: POWER –planning, organizing, writing, editing, and revising assignments. Aside from major essays, students will also write short responses to texts and collaborate on short responses/outlines in groups for class discussion.

CLASSROOM MANAGEMENT PLAN

CORRECTION POLICY

Students will be allowed to correct summative assessments, including a rationale, to earn no more than 50% of the points incorrect within one week from the date of the assignment. These corrections must be scheduled and completed with the AP teacher during non-class time.

LATE WORK

Late work will only be accepted one class period after the date the assignment is due. For an unexcused absence, late work will not be accepted.

- If the student is present in class when work is due and does not hand in the work, late work will receive no more than 50% of the original credit for the assignment.
- For an **excused** absence authorized by the attendance office (via pink readmit slip), the assignment will be due the day you return to school and eligible for full credit.
