GENERAL DESCRIPTION

Escondido Adventist Academy is a K-12 Seventh-day Adventist church-affiliated school which was established in 1903, and became a full Kindergarten – 12th grade program in 1983. EAA was the first private school in Escondido to offer Advanced Placement [AP] classes, and is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges and the Adventist Accrediting Association. EAA is part of the Adventist Education system, the largest protestant educational system in the world.

FACILITIES

EAA is located on 14 acres in the city of Escondido, California at 1301 Deodar Road, just off Interstate 15, north of Hwy 78. Its physical facilities include a 72,000 square foot building which houses classrooms, science and computer laboratories, music department, fine arts studio, library, chapel, gymnasium, and cafeteria. The grounds include a softball and football/soccer field, hard court surfaces, a separate playground area for primary grades, an outdoor amphitheater, and a picnic area.

CURRICULUM

Escondido Adventist Academy offers its students a curriculum that is challenging in content, relevant in focus, and spiritually-rich in its purpose. The program offers solid core classes from the elementary grades to the high school, six AP courses, and a college-prep and an honors diploma. Through projects, presentations, labs, homework, and exams, teachers endeavor to help students reach their full potential. The school's Core Values, the North American Division (NAD) curriculum frameworks, and the California state standards serve as the model for the curriculum. After school study labs are available to help students meet expectations.



EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIS



Students are encouraged to participate in a wide range of activities beyond the classroom including, but not limited to: community service, global missions, music, athletics, student leadership, cross-age teaching, and more.



HIGH SCHOOL ADVANCED PLACEMENT

AP courses are offered in Art History, Biology, Calculus, Chemistry, English Literature, Physics, and Psychology. These courses are based on a 5.0 GPA scale. AP is an open-enrollment program.

HIGH SCHOOL ELECTIVE COURSES

Students in grades 9-12 have the opportunity to take a variety of elective courses including: Art I & II, Chamber Singers (select choir), Sonabella (Handbells), Life Sports, Music Ministry, World Missions, and Yearbook Design.

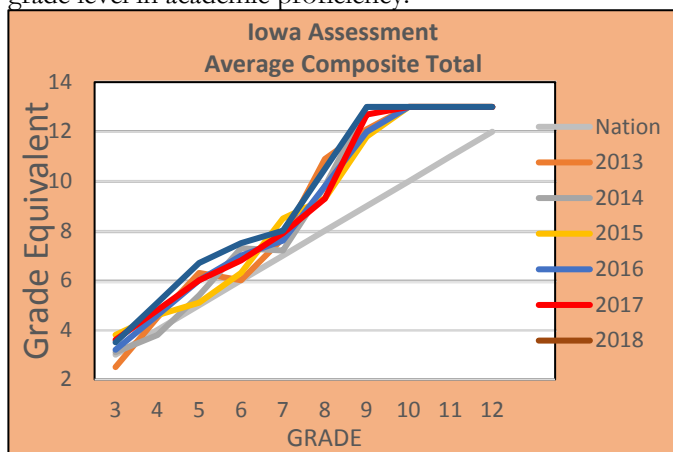
PHYSICAL EDUCATION & ATHLETICS

Physical fitness and athletics are important to the holistic development of young people. EAA offers a K-12 physical education program. In addition to PE courses, Middle School students participate in an area Small Schools League. Their sports include: basketball, flag-football, soccer, softball, and volleyball. High School girls play three California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) Sports: volleyball, basketball, and softball. Boys play flag-football in an Adventist-organized league, as well as, CIF basketball, golf and volleyball.



STANDARDIZED TEST RESULTS

Students at EAA take the Iowa Assessment Test (IA) each Fall. EAA students consistently score above the national average in all areas of the test. Typically by the eighth grade year, the average student is at least 1.5 years above grade level in academic proficiency.



COLLEGE BOARD TESTS

Students regularly participate in the PSAT, SAT, and ACT testing programs. The 2-year average SAT scores are as follows:

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

In compliance with the California high school graduation standards, EAA offers a Basic High School Diploma which requires 240 units of credit.
